Potato Diggers.

PRACTICAL TESTS.

A trial of potato diggers took place in the field of Captain Aylward, Southport, on Tuesday, Oct. 16th, at two o'clock, in the presence of a large number of influential farmers from different farms of Queen's County. McKenzie's potato digger, which took second money at the St. John Dominion Exhibition, was the first to enter the field. He was followed by what is termed Ainsley's machine, a New York invention, for which Dover and Robertson, of this city, are agents. Next came Lane's potato digger, called Common Sense, and lastly Robert Smallwood's machine. The working of these machines in the field was closely watched, and every opportunity was afforded intending purchasers to judge for themselves as to the most practical and best machine. This was not, however, a difficult task, as McKenzie's machine was admitted by all to have performed by far the best work. The following is the report of the judges who acted on the occasion:—

A certain piece of ground was examined after the work was completed. Double the quantity of potatoes was found after the "Common Sense."

After an examination of the potatoes when dug, we find the potatoes to be injured fifty per cent. more after Mr. McLeod's "Beater Digger," than after Mr. Lane's "Common Sense."

We observe that Mr. Lane's "Common Sense" is considerably lighter of draft than Mr. McLeod's "Beater Digger."

Irish National League.

DUBLIN, Oct. 17.

The League meeting at Roslea, County Fermagh, yesterday, was addressed by Messrs. Healey, Sullivan and Biggar, members of Parliament. Michael Davitt, who had been expected to attend, was absent. A meeting of Orangemen was held at the same time. A collision between them and Parnellites was prevented by a force of police and soldiers. The Orangemen at their meeting resolved to do their utmost to resist the attempt to place Ireland under the Government of murderers and rebels.

The Haytien Trouble.

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.

The Atlas Line steamer Alps, which was fired upon at Jeremie, Hayti, on Sept. 20th, while taking on board refugees from the Haytien Revolt, arrived here yesterday. Seven shots were fired at the vessel. Only three, however, struck her, doing considerable damage to the wood work. The Captain considers it an outrage upon the British flag inasmuch as he was acting under orders of the British Consul. H. M. S. "Dido" has been sent to investigate, and will demand satisfaction.

An Absconding Bank Cashier's Confession.

LONDON, Oct. 17.

George Worden, the defaulting manager of the London and River Plate Bank, has made a full confession of the manner in which he absconded and disposed of the bonds deposited in the Bank. The arrest and imprisonment of Watters, the Stock Broker, was owing to statements made by Worden implicating him in the speculation.

The Liberals in Session.

LONDON, Oct. 17.

The Liberal Conference will begin its annual session at Leeds to-day. John Morley, M. P. for New Castle, will preside over its deliberation. Mr. John Bright and Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, President of the Board of Trade, will participate in the proceedings of the conference.

Fatal Railway Accident.

CHAATANOOGA, Tenn., Oct. 17.

On the East Tennessee, Murgena and Georgia Railway last night, two freight trains collided near Cleveland, Tenn., while running at a high rate of speed. The engineer, fireman and brakeman, were killed, and five others injured.

A Fatal Row.

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.

John Irving and John Walsh, widely known and notorious burglars, while under the influence of liquor, shot and killed each other this morning in Shang Draper's saloon 466 Sixth Avenue.

Trichinosis Spreading in Saxony.

LONDON, Oct. 17.

Four hundred persons are prostrated by trichinosis in ten villages in Saxony. Fifty of the sufferers are in a hopeless condition. Deaths from the disease are occurring daily.

An Assignment.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 17.

The Norbones Weider Glass, Paint and Color Manufacturing Co. has made an assignment to Stephen Monarty. Its assets are \$50,000, and liabilities not yet known.

A Heavy Failure in New York.

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.

Addler Bros. & Newbomer, wholesale dry goods dealers, 369 Broadway, made an assignment yesterday giving preferences amounting to \$167,000.

New Trial Granted to a Murderer.

NEWARK, N. J., Oct. 17.

A new trial has been granted in John Chisholm's case, convicted of wife murder. He had been sentenced to be hanged in November.

Burning Weed.

LYNCHBURGH, Va., Oct. 17.

The tobacco factories of A. H. Leftwick, were burned to-day. Loss, \$45,000. Over 200,000 lbs. of tobacco were burned.

Judge Lynch at Work.

CHARLOTTE, N. C., Oct. 17.

A negro murderer was taken from jail at Statesville last night, by thirty masked men, and hanged to a tree.

Cetewayo to Surrender.

DURBAN, Oct. 17.

Cetewayo, the Zulu King, will surrender to the British authorities. He will be conveyed to Natal.
