WINNIPEG (CP)—George Traflet, former coach of Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Western Interprovincial Football Union, flew into Winnipeg from Los Angeles Sunday to attend Monday's funeral of Tommy Lumsden, 25-year-old Bomber end, who died last week.

"It's 5,000 miles of flying and I can only be here for a couple of days, but I felt I owed it to Lumsden," Traflet said. "Tom gave everything when he played for me and asked nothing in return."

Lumsden died Friday morning following an emergency operation after he suffered a bladder attack. He joined the Bombers in 1951 and had already signed his 1955 contract.
