TV Construction At Local Station

Construction of station C.F.C.Y. T.V. is proceeding according to schedule and the station is ex-pected to go on the air within the next month or two, said officials of CFCY at a date, not yet set, in June test programming will start with the hope of regular pro-gramming about July 1st.

The antenna has now reached an elevation of 400 feet and will reach its ultimate height of 600 feet within the next few weeks. The station is scheduled to carry the regular CBC programs, there will also be facilities for the tele-vision of local live programs. All programs will originate from the station site at Strathgarny. In an area roughly from Summerside to Montague and from New Glas-gow, N.S. to Rustico a simple indoor antenna should be suffi-cient. With regard to the quality of reception, officials are optimis-tic, but from an engineering point of view they are satisfied that Channel 13 will provide good ser-vice.
