GLOUCESTER MINING COMPANY

Arrived at San Francisco from Gloucester Mass.—a trip of 22,000 Miles in 122 Days.

The many friends of Mr. Clement S. Pelly of this city will be pleased to hear of his arrival at San Francisco, safe and well. Mr. Pelly writes that they had a very rough passage from Gloucester to the Horn, but making time of 65 days. While nearing Cape Horn they encountered heavy gales carrying away the ship's cross-trees and parts of her rigging but they got through it with marvelous speed in such circumstances. Another vessel which left 10 days ahead of the Phillips had not arrived at San Francisco up to the time Mr. Pelly wrote. There were scores of boats in the harbor awaiting to board the vessel before she dropped the anchor. The Phillips will be put on the ship to get overhauled, and then she will proceed to the Yukon. They have two large steam launches and several dories which they will also take with them. They have a two years' supply of provisions and a goodly supply of coal. One launch, which is in sections in the hold of the vessel, will be put together at San Francisco by Mr. Pelly and two other machinists and three carpenters.

The Boston Globe contains a lengthy article, including a sketch of all the company, on their departure from Gloucester. Mr. Clement S. Pelly is the eldest son of Mr. N. Pelly, of the SS. Stanley, and is a first class machinist.

DEATH OF MRS. HANFORD.

The Press of Amherst, reports that for some weeks previous to her death the deceased lady had been suffering from cardiac asthma and her life had been despaired of.
