EARLY CLOSING EVENTS CLOSE JUNE 1st. FOR NIGHT RACING

The following is a list of early closing events and conditioned Races.

- No. 1. The Charlottetown Driving Park Free-for-All Trot and Pace. Purse \$1050. To be raced in three dashes Saturday Night, July 7th. Entries close June 1st, 1951. First Payment \$20.00 due June 1st, 1951. Final payment of \$10.00 due June 27th, 1951, when horses must be named. All dashes one mile.
- No. 2. The 2:14 Pace. Purse \$900. To be raced Friday night, July 13th. Entries close June 1st, 1951. First payment \$20.00 due June 1st, 1951. Final payment of \$7.00 due June 27th, 1951, when horses must be named. To be raced in Three Dashes. All Dashes one mile.

- No. 5. The Charlottetown Driving Park Free For All Trot—Purse \$750. To be raced in three dashes Saturday night, July 28th. Entries close June 1, 1951. First payment of \$15.00 due June 1, 1951. Final payment of \$7.50 due June 27th, 1951 when horses must be named. All dashes one mile.
- No. 6. The 2:24 Trot Conditioned. Purse \$600. To be raced in three dashes Saturday Night, August 4th. 2:19-2:20-2:21-2:22-2:23—Class Trotters winning less than \$800 in 1950 also eligible. WARNING—We would warn all parties purchasing race horses, particularly from the upper provinces, to be sure they are registered and if raced get their eligibility certificates. We have received two letters from persons who bought horses and now being able to get the necessary certificate of breeding required to secure an eligibility certificate. We would also advise all breeders who have foals of 1951 to have them registered in the United States Trotting Association this year because the fee for weanlings is only \$5.00, but is \$15.00 for other ages. No horse can race unless registered.

Cecil B. Drake of Cardigan has sold his pacing mare Nellie Worthy to Jack McKay of Mount Hope and his three-year-old bay filly Bellini Might, and three-year-old bay filly Seconds Count, to Rollie Wood Southport. The former is sired by Abner T. Clegg and shows lots of speed and Seconds Count is by Real Money 2:09 1/4, dam Frisco Girl by Lusty Frisco 2:07 1/4, grand dam Quinla 2:04 1/2.

Our thanks to Dr. F. C. Dougan for his 1951 booklet with eligibilities of Maritime owned trotters and pacers; also important rules with questions and answers. First there is a complete alphabetical list of Maritime horses with their winnings and class eligibility. Then a list of pacers eligible to classes from 2:09 to 2:30. Similarly a list of trotters for classes from 2:10 to 2:30. It will be very useful for race secretaries in making up their programmes and also to horsemen, particularly the list of important rules and their application.

exempt from the license fee. There are thousands of hunters living in country districts who are every bit as died-in-the-wool nimrods as any of their city cousins. Exempt a farmer, or his help, from having to buy a license to hunt if they stay on their own property. If they choose to wander all over the country let them contribute toward the general fish and game build-up.

There are approximately 550 country school districts in the Province. I would say off hand that the average number of hunters per School District is approximately 10. Some will run considerably higher while others will drop to 6 or 8. An offhand check on the districts of Mount Albion, Pownal and Alexandra indicates an average of 12 or better. At \$100 per head this would result in an

annual income in excess of \$5,000. This columnist has felt for some time that Urban dwellers should be assessed two separate licenses... one for hunting and the other for angling at \$1.00 each. If this were done the additional revenue from the inclusion of farmers (who hunt) in the license bracket, and the extra dollar tacked onto Urban hunters, would exceed \$10,000. Already the boost of Non-resident angling licenses from two to three dollars and the inclusion of the fair sex as paying members in the angling and hunting fraternity is expected to result in increased revenue to the tune of fifteen hundred or two thousand dollars.

The income from this new license source will exceed \$10,000 and this amount spent on dam building program after the pattern of the Dingwells Mill and the Lot 40 dams would build twenty large dams every year. The new system dispenses with a flume or waste-gate. Instead the course of the stream is diverted and a bulldozer used to build an embankment across the original channel. Incoming sea trout to be able to new creek channel and enter the dam at will. How long they remain depends upon the mood of the trout themselves. The average cost of such dams should not exceed \$500.00. At a time when everyone is concerned over the building up of our fish and game resources no one should object in contributing one dollar to the pot.

Kid Howard Wins Decision

GLACE BAY, N.S., May 24 — (CP) — Dick (Kid) Howard, Maritime lightweight champ, moved one step closer to a chance at the Canadian crown here Thursday by scoring an unanimous decision over Jean Richard of Montreal, in an unimpressive holiday bout watched by 1,800 fans.

Howard, who weighed 134, one pound heavier than his opponent, had a heavy margin in the voting of judge George Quirk and referee John Joe MacLean. Judge Matthias Gouthro gave each fighter three rounds and called four even. The Canadian Press scorecard tallied four rounds for each and tallied two even.

It was Howard's third conquest over the Montrealer in five meetings. Richard won the other two by decisions.

Tonight's bout was billed as the first match in an elimination series for the Canadian lightweight title vacated by Lil' Arthur King of Toronto.

New Treatment For Alcoholism

NEW YORK, May 25—(AP)—A drugless way to treat alcoholism, by diet alone, is reported by Dr. Roger J. Williams, world-famed biochemist of the University of Texas.

Dr. Williams tells of the experiments in his book "Nutrition and Alcoholism" (University of Oklahoma Press). Under his plan each alcoholic is studied for nutritional needs. These include calories, vitamins and minerals.

He says eight groups of doctors in the U.S. are trying diet treatments. In some cases success is complete and in others partial. He gives no specific diet.

He outlines instead a new idea about alcoholism. The idea is that alcoholics drink because there is something lacking in their daily meals.

If a deficiency is found to be the cause of alcoholism, it is necessary for the person under treatment to avoid that deficiency all his life.

Laboratory rats furnished the first surprise. They drank heavily when their food was just at the bare existence stage. They cut down their alcohol when food got better. B vitamins had quick effects in turning most rats away from alcohol.

Dr. Williams says that hereditary differences are important in fixing food needs to reduce alcoholic craving.

He says there probably are other diseases in which food plays an important part. Among these are the list arthritis, multiple sclerosis (a nerve trouble), rheumatic fever, gout, high blood pressure and insomnia.
