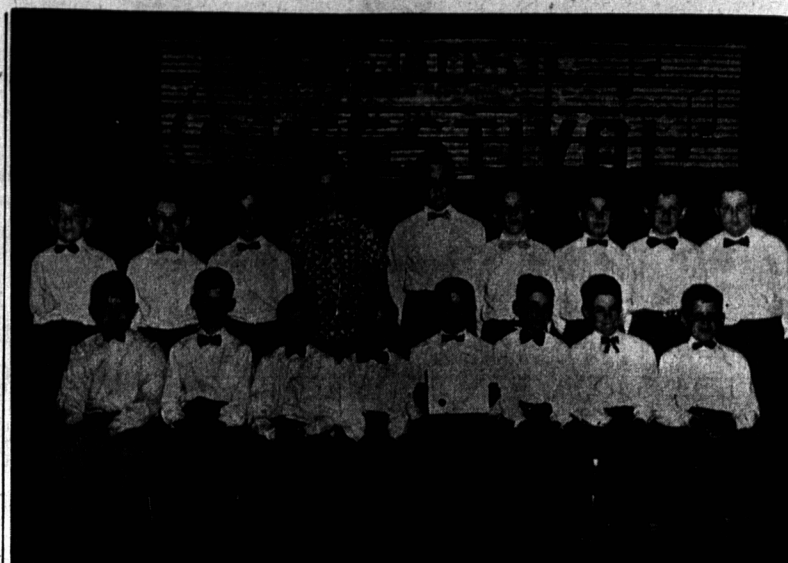

weeks each year, U.S.-grown potatoes come into Canada duty-free. On this account, the Maine growers can often undersell the growers of the Maritime Provinces.

Mr. MacNaught reviewed the history of tariffs on potatoes across the border between the two countries since 1929, indicating that there had been a growing advantage for the U.S. growers in the Canadian market. In 1929, he said, the U.S. duty on Canadian potatoes was 50 cents a bushel and a Canadian tariff on U.S. potatoes was 35 cents a bushel. In 1930 the duty on potatoes in each country was 75 cents a bushel.

Later there came a differential between Canadian table stock and Canadian seed potatoes entering the United States. Still later, Canada eliminated the tariff on U.S. potatoes except for a six weeks period when it was fixed at 37 1/2 cents a bushel. Since 1948, he said, Canada may ship two and a half million bushels of seed potatoes to the United States at a tariff rate of 38 1/2 cents and a half million bushels of table stock at the same rate. Above these quotas, the U.S. tariff has been 75 cents a bushel.

Mr. MacNaught drew a hearty round of applause at the conclusion of his brief but searching address.

## Report Fishermen Adrift On Ice

JAKOBHAVN, Greenland (AP)—Dozens of Greenland fishermen were reported adrift Tuesday night on three ice floes off the west coast of Greenland.

At least 26 men from Jakobshavn and an unknown number from districts were marooned on splitting ice Monday night.

Rescue teams carried dinghies six miles overland Tuesday for launching at the settlement of Autlaintarfik, where the floes are expected to pass.

## Amalgamated Dairies Ltd. Hold 2nd Annual Meeting

A net operating profit of \$5,707.97 on total sales of \$1,025,300.41 after a bonus of 1 1/2 cents per lb. buterfat, amounting to \$17,172.13, was distributed to patrons for the year 1954 as shown in the financial report of Amalgamated Dairies Ltd. at the second annual meeting held last evening in the auditorium of the Canadian Legion Home in Summerside.

The meeting was presided over by the president of the board of directors, Mr. Murdoch McLeod of Long River whose report revealed that 1,171,300 pounds of butter, 535,870 pounds of cheese and 14,201 pounds of whey butter had been produced and sold during 1954.

For the second year in a row Mr. Scott Cairns of Freetown received the Canadian Bank of Commerce trophy as the leading cream patron, while the award for the leading milk patron went to Reeves Bros. of Freetown.

The new board of directors recommended by the nominating committee and approved by the meeting are: Eastern district, Bennett Deegan, Bradalbane, 2 years; O'Leary district, Lester Wallace, 3 years and Arnold Wood 1 year; Grand River district, Angus Gillis, 3 years; Bedouque district, Daniel McCardle, 3 years; Tyne Valley district, Henry Maynard, 3 years; Tryon district, Harold Nuttall, 3 years. The retiring directors are: Harold MacIntyre, Grand River district, William J. Dennis, Tyne Valley district, W. J. Reid, Bedouque district, and Joseph Murphy, Tryon district.

The financial report read by Mr. T. Earle Hickey, C.A., showed that total assets are \$530,186.97.

The report estimated that an additional \$12,000, will be received from the Federal Government as subsidy for the cheese building extension and equipment.

Mr. Edson Rayner, Clermont, gave the delegates' report of the P.E.I. Dairyman's Association annual meeting during which he said a resolution was passed at the meeting in which the directors were to ask the Provincial Government to send out fieldmen to assist farmer patrons in increasing the quality of milk and cream that is brought to the dairy. Mr. Rayner also gave a brief delegates' report of the Federation of Agriculture annual meeting and stated that a resolution regarding the maintenance of freight service on P.E.I. was passed, because of the C.N.R.'s sweeping changes proposed in the constitutional organization of the new union can do much to promote the welfare of organized labor in the community.

Mr. Arnold Wood, West Cape and Mr. Allison Proffitt, Freetown were appointed western and eastern representatives of the association to attend the annual Federation of Agriculture meeting.

A directors meeting immediately after, re-elected Mr. Murdoch Dawson as president and Mr. C. M. Arsenault, Abram's Village as vice president of the association.
