

Junior Victorias Win Way To Finals In Twin Victory Over Kinsmen

"Had" Macinnis' Junior Victorias will meet the Knights of Columbus Juniors in the City Junior Baseball League finals for the second year in a row as a result of their doubleheader win over the Kinsmen yesterday afternoon at the Memorial Field diamond. In two well played games the Vics won the best two out of three series by scores of 6-5 and 12-4. The games were the fifth and sixth attempts of the teams to end the series.

The first game was a thriller all the way with the Kinsmen coming within an ace of tying the game up in the bottom half of the ninth but a great throw by Vic rightfielder Art Hughes cut down the runner at the plate with a perfect toss from his outgarden post.

The game was a southpaw's battle all the way with Benny Carson, Kinsmen pitching sensation, losing out to Allan "Junior" MacLeod of the Vics. The winners took a three to nothing lead in the top half of the third inning when they tallied three times on two hits, a walk, an error and a wild pitch. The Kinsmen countered with a tally in the same inning on a walk, a hit batter, two fielder's choices and a safety. The Vics made the count read 4-1 in the top of the fourth on two hits and an error. However the Kinsmen battled right back into the picture with two runs in their half of the same inning. They combined a hit, a fielder's choice (an error) and two hit batters for their runs. The Vics added singletons in the fifth and seventh innings for their six runs. The Kinsmen came back with a singleton in the eighth and made a big rally in the last half of the ninth which netted them one run. They smashed MacLeod's offerings for four of their seven hits during the game in the last two frames.

MacLeod pitched brilliant ball for the Vics giving up seven blows, four of which went to the Kinsmen first baseman Des Trainor, while walking one, hitting three, and whiffing six. Carson was touched for eight hits by the Vics while walking two, hitting one and striking out ten batters. Trainor was the hitting star of the game with a four for four day at bat. McCallum and Cleo Gillis were the Vics' leading batters with two hits in four times at bat.

The most important piece of sporting news in the City over the weekend was the Vic-Kinsmen doubleheader clash at the Memorial Field diamond Sunday afternoon when the Vics swept both games and thereby earned their way into the finals. It was his first loss of the series with the other four games being called no contests because of darkness. The Vics used Allan MacLeod, a southpaw, against the Kinsmen in the opener and the youngster came up with a great game against the MacFarlane-coached crew. He held them to seven hits with the losers getting four of these in the last two innings.

In the second game which turned out to be a slugfest, the Vics' infield put on a terrific exhibition of fielding. True, they had four errors but they had three double plays and cut off four other runners on base. Hennessy and Flynn combined on five different plays. Hennessy had seven assists and two putouts while Flynn had four putouts and three assists.
