SCOTT ACT.—A summons charging a first infraction of the Scott Act, was last evening served on William Macdonald, William is supposed to be selling on the premises of James Cummings.

TRADE AND SHIPPING.—By cable to Gen. H. Tombs we learn that the brig, Irma, Taylor, master, arrived at Bristol Channel 18 days from Canoe.

By West India circulars we learn that the brig, Capt. Gordon, arrived at Demerara 27 days from Summerville, landing 41 horses on Nov. 9th.

The schr. Ida, Fraser, arrived at the same port with 15 horses, 21 days from Summerville, Nov. 10th.

The schr. Mystery, Richards, arrived at Barbadoes on Nov. 8th, 16 days from Summerville, where she landed 19 horses and proceeded to Trinidad, landing 11 horses on the 13th, and cleared for Buenos Ayres on the 21st in ballast.

At an auction sale of P. E. Island horses on the 21st November, Port of Spain, Trinidad, prices ranged from \$65 down to \$35. Not very paying prices, with a \$35 freight and all other added expenses.

THREE CHILDREN INJURED.—According to a correspondent of the Guardian last Sunday morning three children of Mr. James Reeves, Upper Freetown, were very badly hurt by a runaway team. The children, the eldest of whom was about thirteen years of age, were driving a horse to their home to their grandfather's Mr. Charles Reeves, Lower Freetown, when their horse took fright and ran away throwing them out. The eldest had his head very badly cut, another, a little girl, was badly bruised about the face, while the third, a little boy, was thrown against a wire fence, severely lacerating his hand. The horse broke clear of the wagon, and was caught some time after in Lower Freetown.

SELF DENIAL WEEK.—At the meeting of the Salvation Army, held last night, the result of their work during self-denial week was made known. The amount collected greatly exceeded the expectations. The "target" set for the Charlottetown corps was \$375, but when the different sums were added together it was found that the handsome sum of \$500 had been collected. Of this amount the soldiers contributed \$24.30, they collected \$402.57, and the sum of \$10 was taken at collections. All over \$225 is to remain in the city and all the Army work here. Last year the "target" set was \$280, and the sum collected was \$380. The result is highly complimentary to Ensign Hendricks, Capt. Prince and Lieut. Coolen, as well as all others who took part in the work.

DEMORST MEDAL CONTEST.—A large audience attended the Demorest Medal Contest in St. James Hall last evening, and thoroughly appreciated the proceedings. The contestants were Wendell Phillips, Lea Seaman, George Strickland, Ernest Mitchell, Gower McLean, Nelson Riggs and Arthur Brennan. While all did exceedingly well it was thought that the three best were McLean, Riggs and Seaman, and the judges requested each of these to read an extra selection. This was done, and the medal was awarded Master Riggs. The judges were Messrs. T. F. Fullerton and C. W. Corey, and Dr. Taylor. An interesting programme of vocal and instrumental music was disposed of during the evening. Mr. T. C. James made an excellent chairman.

THE ENTERTAINMENT TO-MORROW NIGHT.

The following is extracted from an extensive programme in the Hants Journal of April 22nd, 1895.

"The performance opened, after an orchestral selection by the 78th band, with the dance of the Gondoliers.
