British Liberal Paper Commends Canadian Stand

LONDON (CP)—The Manchester Guardian says Canada has "frankly taken over" the moral leadership of the Commonwealth from Britain during the Middle East crisis.

It says she did so by proposing a United Nations force "without waiting for Britain to agree to it," at a time when British policies were coming "desperately close" to forfeiting the confidence of Commonwealth countries.

The independent Liberal newspaper, which has consistently opposed the government's Middle East policy, reviews the position of each Commonwealth country in turn, and says Britain can escape destroying the association only if "we are ready to sit down with our friends and talk with the candour, patience and humility which should always obtain between members of the Commonwealth, and which we have for a time mislaid."

CANADA APPROVED
Canada's efforts at mediation in the United Nations have been referred to briefly by other British

newspapers during the crisis, usually with approval or non-committally.

The new leader of Britain's small Liberal party, Joseph Grimond, has several times referred in the House of Commons to Canada's "willing" United Nations resolution, and Tuesday night said in a radio broadcast that Canada had in effect saved Britain's bacon.

There has also been some comment here, in the newspapers and among parliamentary observers, on the origin of the Canadian move for a UN police force. A question that has been asked is whether the idea belongs uniquely to External Affairs Minister Pearson, who formally proposed it in the General Assembly, or whether it had its genesis in an earlier speech by Prime Minister Eden.

Recommend Beacons On Jets To Prevent Collisions At Night

MONTREAL (CP) — High-powered beacon lights, visible from five to 10 miles, may become standard on all jet-powered aircraft to prevent mid-air collisions at night.

This was one of the recommendations of the five-week air navigation conference of the International Civil Aviation Organization, just concluded in Montreal. About 125 delegates from 28 countries and four international air organizations attended.

The conference recommended a panel of experts be called to discuss aircraft identification lights, and research on the situation accelerated. They noted that jets meeting in mid-air have sometimes carried off the tail-tip of the

other plane with no knowledge on either side as to how it happened. It was imperative, said the conference, that powerful lights in addition to the red, green and white identification lights now prescribed for all aircraft, be developed. Because of jet speeds, such lights must have a five-to-10-mile range, must flash intermittently—to distinguish them from stars—and must indicate the direction the plane is flying.

REVISE STANDARDS
International standards of airworthiness for all transport aircraft were revised and broadened as the conference went through a 700-page book of requirements for take-off, landings, maintenance, and flight safety. The aim was to generalize requirements so each could be revised quickly in the light of new developments in air engineering and design.

MACKAY TO SPEAK

FREDERICTON (CP) — T. E. Mackay, chief of Ontario's forest protection division, will address delegates to the 20th annual meeting of the Maritime section of the Canadian Institute of Forestry here Thursday.

No final decision was reached on the question of rear-facing seats in aircraft. It was decided that so far it has not been definitely established that such seats increase air safety. If such a pattern does emerge, it was likely the question would be considered at a future meeting. Recommendations now must be approved by the ICAO air navigation commission and the ICAO council before coming into effect, possibly in six months.

Recall World Events At Last U. S. Election

Election day in the United States found the Middle East and central Europe the centres of world tension.

Four years ago it was Korea, but apart from the change in place-lines there is striking similarity between the news that made headlines then and today's major international events.

These parallels were drawn from Canadian Press files of Nov. 4, election day in 1952, and those of Tuesday.

1952, Seoul: An uneasy calm settled over the frost-nipped Korean central and eastern fronts. Dispatches continued that despite the lull, renewed fighting could erupt at any moment.

1952, Cairo: British, French commandos swept ashore near Port Said. In London, Prime Minister Eden said Britain and France will order a cease fire if technicians can remain to clear the Suez Canal of obstructions.

1952, United Nations: Delegates studied a Canadian suggestion that a group of neutral powers screen Chinese and North Korean prisoners in a special zone as a method of ending a deadlock over a Korean ceasefire.

1952, United Nations: Delegates studied a Canadian suggestion for organizing a United Nations force to bring peace to the Middle East.

1952, London: The Queen, opening her first Parliament, read from the speech from the throne: "I earnestly pray that in Korea an early armistice will be arranged. Until this is accomplished the continued participation of my forces in this conflict will be clear proof of my government's whole-hearted attachment to the ideals of the United Nations."

To Facilitate Entry Of Hungarian Refugees

OTTAWA (CP) — The federal government has taken steps to facilitate the entry into Canada of Hungarians who have fled to Austria to escape Soviet oppression in their homeland.

Immigration Minister Pickersgill said Tuesday in a statement that Canada will give priority to applications for refugees from Hungary to enter this country as immigrants. Hungarians will be eligible for assisted passage loans on the same terms as other immigrants from Europe.

The immigration department also released figures showing that the number of immigrants landed in Canada in the first nine months of 1956 rose by 23,402 to 110,009 from 86,607 in the corresponding period a year ago.

Mr. Pickersgill said the Canadian immigration office in Vienna has been instructed to give priority to applications by refugees from Hungary.

Department officials said they have no idea how many Hungarians may come to Canada under the plan. Vienna dispatches estimate that more than 11,000 Hungarians now have escaped to Austria and that the number will grow as more leave Hungary under cover of darkness.

In the first nine months of 1956 Hungarian immigrants to Canada totalled 369 compared with 329 in the corresponding period last year. The government's new policy is expected to result in the number of immigrants arriving this year rising sharply over previous years. Immigration in the past nine months has shown a big increase in arrivals from the British Isles. Entries from England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales increased to 34,734 from 24,032 in the corresponding nine months in 1955.
