Education Act Revision Slated

Dr. George Dewar, minister of education, announced a revision in the Prince Edward Island School Act yesterday morning. He called it a complete statutory revision of the province's school act. The revision will be undertaken later this year.

Dr. Dewar said he plans to name a committee to work on consolidating the act and the act is intended for presentation at the next session of the Legislature for approval.

The minister said he expects that the committee members will be deputy education minister Malcolm MacKenzie, deputy attorney-general Arthur McGeehan and Charlottetown lawyer Alan Scales.

Dr. Dewar said consolidation of the act is necessary in view of the many amendments made to it at legislative sessions since 1951. He said "the act has been

amended every year and there is now a pressing need for a legal consolidation of it"

Name Chairman For Loan Board

Fisheries Minister Leo Rossier announced yesterday that Leonard Beasley of the fisheries department has been appointed temporary chairman of the P.E.I. Fishermen's Loan Board. At a meeting of the cabinet yesterday, the resignation of A.W. Gaudet, Charlottetown, as chairman of the board was accepted.

Fishermen in the Gulf of St. Lawrence recently caught a giant sea turtle, seven feet long and weighing nearly half a ton.

Montague Rink Demolition Is Approved

OTTAWA (Special) — Demolition of the present Montague rink as a winter works project has been approved by the federal department of labor it was announced here Tuesday by John Mullally MP for Kings.

The labor cost of the project has been estimated at \$4,000 of which \$2,400 will be paid by the federal government. Removal of the rink is estimated to provide employment for 20 men for about 20 days.

Mr. Mullally said that work is to begin at once so that it can be completed before April 30, which is the date the winter works program terminates.

Agriculture Agreement Under Review

Agricultural Minister Andrew MacRae took a copy of the new federal-provincial agreement on agricultural rehabilitation and development to yesterday's cabinet meeting for review. The agreement has already

been signed by Forestry Minister Maurice Sauvé.

The former agreement expired March 31, and the signing of the new agreement was forecast in the Speech from the Throne at the opening of the recent session of the provincial legislature.

Mr. MacRae said he was "not completely satisfied" with the contents of the new agreement and suggested that the act may be amended in view of rural development proposals contained in yesterday's Speech from the Throne opening a new session of Parliament.

He added "I hope these promised programs will now be implemented."

Throne was caused a "very pleasing document" by Premier Walter R. Shaw. He also said that it contained many provisions that he would like to see fulfilled.

He added however "there were a good many things that were a repetition of what we have been expecting over the years."

The premier said he was "discouraged" waiting for the fulfillment over the past years of some of the promises made in the Throne Speech yesterday.

Premier Shaw Urges Help In Ending Water Pollution

Province-wide support of the "help stop water pollution" theme of National Wildlife Week was urged yesterday by Premier Walter R. Shaw.

In a prepared statement Premier Shaw said:

"This week is 'National Wildlife Week' in Canada; a week when people on Prince Edward Island and all across Canada are asked to concentrate on the value of wildlife and other natural resources to human welfare. The subject chosen by government wildlife agencies during this year's National Wildlife Week is the increasing problem of water pollution. We on Prince Edward Island are pleased to support this nation-wide program which has as its theme, 'Help Stop Water Pollution.'"

In its pure clean natural condition water is one of the most useful gifts of nature. We need fresh clean water to drink every day of our lives and for use in preparing and cooking food. Even larger amounts of water are needed to keep ourselves, our clothes and our homes clean. Clean water provides us with much of our summer fun—swimming, boating, fishing—and gives us reason for our picnics and camping trips. Clean water even provides some of our food.

USED INDUSTRIALLY
Water provides electrical power and serves as a highway for ships and boats. It is used to irrigate farm crops and to keep lawns and gardens green and productive. Large quantities of water are used in industrial processes for cleaning, cooling, diluting, or as part of the product.

Water is a precious life-sustaining resource, but we may be taking it too much for granted. Authorities on water resources have estimated that in the four Atlantic Provinces average daily consumption approaches 700 gallons per capita and that by the year 2,000 our requirements will have risen three-fold. The higher our standards of living rises, the more demand there will be for water to serve homes, industries and agriculture and to remove our wastes. Many of our more industrialized parts of Canada find themselves very short of clean usable water.

Here on our fair Island, surrounded by the sea, it is difficult to imagine that we could ever have a water shortage problem. However, one thing is certain. An underground water supply is not a fully renewable natural resource; it tends more and more to be "mined" like ores. At present, no one knows how large the supply is and how long it will last.

MORE APPARENT
Pollution is also becoming more apparent in some of our streams, ponds and harbors, where the waters have been contaminated with man's wastes and he by-product of industrial processors. These areas have lost much of their natural beauty and appeal and we have suffered as a result. Water pollution endangers human health, destroys fish and wildlife and

their habitats, limits opportunities for outdoor recreation and lowers property values.

In awareness of the need for more strict control over the use of our ground and surface water supplies, steps were taken during the last sitting of the legislature to establish a Prince Edward Island Water Authority. It will be the responsibility of the authority to see that we make the best use of our water supplies and deal effectively with the problem of water pollution.

We hope that everyone will lend their support to the theme of National Wildlife Week and do their part in "Helping to Stop Water Pollution."

Citizens Urged To Clean Up House Rubbish

City Fire Inspector Louis Ranahan has warned citizens of fire hazards involved in allowing rubbish to accumulate around the home.

The city Fire Prevention Bureau has asked all citizens to get rid of such trash as soon as possible.

The inspector suggested every one should check to see that rubbish was not creating a fire hazard by being near furnaces or other heaters.

He said rubbish stored in garages or even outside could be just as dangerous to safety.

In asking for the co-operation of home owners and business houses in this type of clean-up campaign, Inspector Ranahan reminded them they were not only getting rid of potential fire hazards, but were also greatly improving the appearance of their properties.
