Industrial Loans Are Proving Their Worth, Says Mr. Cullen

"The loans made under the Industrial Establishments Promot- ion Act have been a good thing for the industry of the Province and they have cost the Province nothing," said Hon. Eugene Cullen in the Legislature yesterday. He had just tabled the report of the Advi- sory Committee under the Act.

"The loans have not only done a great deal to establish new indus- tries but have been of outstanding assistance to some of our older industries", he said.

The Minister said that most of the loans were in good shape with some of the firms having made very substantial repayments. It could hardly be expected that much could be repaid the first year, he said.
