he had a partner who could still take a capable hand in the proceedings. If West made a bid in response to East's double, North-South would be automatically rescued from a dangerous position; and if (as actually would have been the case) West made the penalty pass, North would certainly follow the course that his holding dictated. From South's point of view, any suit North was justified in mentioning could not be too bad, and so a pass by South was the only remotely reasonable course. Given the chance, North undoubtedly would have bid two hearts over a penalty pass by West, and at this heart contract would have been relatively safe, but North couldn't "move" over two spades doubled, and the consequence was an 1100-point penalty.
