SETS GLIDING RECORD BISHOP Calls (AP) - Betsy Woodward, 26, of Ridewood, B.I., has broken the women's world record for solo gliding by soaring to an altitude of 40,160 feet over the High Sierra range. A tow-plane released Miss Woodward at 12,000 feet. She pointed her sailplane into the swift-rising Sierra wave—a tremendous force of air glancing upward from the mountains below—and rose to the record breaking height.

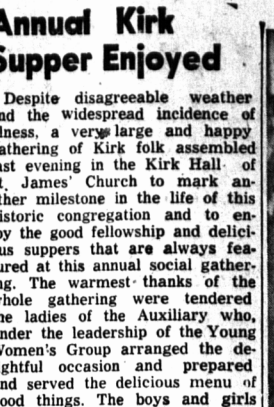

Liberal Candidates For Second Queens Nominated

Mr. George C. Kitson, M.L.A., Hampshire, and John J. Mustard of Charlottetown, were nominated yesterday afternoon in the Clover Club to contest the coming election of the Liberal party in the Second District of Queens. All polls were represented at the largely attended meeting with 85 out of the 90 eligible delegates. Percy Boyle of Hunter River presided.

Mr. Kitson's nomination was moved by Earl Simpson, Rustico, and seconded by Augustus Tierney of New Haven. The nomination was unopposed.

Mr. Mustard won his nomination on a vote of 48-37 against Mr. Reuel LePage of Charlottetown, a candidate in the last provincial election in Second Queens. At the conclusion of the meeting, Mr. LePage moved that Mr. Mustard's nomination be made unanimous.

Nominating Mr. Mustard was, Laughlin MacKinnon, Canoe Cove, and seconding was Moses Butte, North Rustico. Mr. LePage's name was introduced to the convention by Colin D. MacPhail of Meadowbank and seconded by Rouel Gauthier, North Rustico.

Following a brief address of appreciation from the two successful candidates, Premier A. W. Matheson spoke.

Mr. Matheson told the meeting that the West River bridge promised last year was no election dodge and that the tenders would be called either today or Monday and work started within four weeks.

"The rural electrification program," said the Premier, "is well in advance of what had first been anticipated, and we now anticipate that it will be completed at the end of three years, instead of five." He also stated that the Government had erected lines last year at a cost considerably less than that of Nova Scotia or New Brunswick.

"The small plant which has been referred to in the press, will form the nucleus of a large frozen food industry in the Province," he said. "There are two other organizations interested in this phase of the Island's economy to a much greater extent."

Mr. Kitson is sitting in the House of Assembly for the second term. He lives at Hampshire and for many years has been a noted breeder of fine beef cattle and pure bred horses.

Mr. Mustard is a former member of the Legislature having been elected in the Cardigan District on two occasions before the war. He served with the R.C.A.F. during hostilities but did not contest an election since. He makes his home in the Charlottetown Royalty and conducts a machinery business in the city.

Second Inoculation Of Polio Vaccine Next Week

With the results of the success of Salk Vaccine against polio very prominent in the press of the past few days, the Provincial Department of Health has made all arrangements to give the second inoculation of the vaccine in the Charlottetown area at Summerside schools and at 80 rural regional centres next week.

The rural clinics will be held in the same places, on the same day and at the same time as those held last week. It is hoped that the roads will have dried up enough to make travelling easier than it was for the first clinics.

Although 70 per cent of all the Grade I pupils in the province received their first inoculation last week, there were many more whose parents had requested the vaccine but who were not able to attend the clinics. These children may receive their first inoculation of Salk Vaccine next week.

The Grade I pupils and their parents will be happy to know that as a result of the report of the Salk Vaccine, only two inoculations will be given this spring instead of the three originally stated. The third one will be given next fall.

At the clinics to be held next week, parents may take babies from three months of age and preschool children to commence inoculations against diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus or for a re-inforcing dose. Vaccination against smallpox also will be available.

As the Health Department has not enough Salk Vaccine at present to immunize more children against polio, only the Grade I pupils will be eligible for inoculation next week. It is hoped that later on in the season it will be possible to expand the program so that many more school children may be given protection against polio.

P. E. I. Dairy Farmers Lead Publicity Fund

"The dairy farmers of P. E. Island exceeded those of any other province in Canada in reaching almost one hundred per cent of their potential 'set-aside' last year to be devoted to advertising and publicity," Mr. O. J. W. Shugg told the directors of the P. E. Island Dairymen's Association at a meeting here yesterday. The amount was \$7,843.23.

The speaker continued, "Dairy Farmers' advertising program, by itself, would be relatively ineffective without strong merchandising support. Unfortunately, this does not develop by itself. The planning and production of ads begins seven months before the actual promotion." He then described the necessity of advances to the dairy trade, grocers, hotels, restaurants etc.

Mr. Shugg went on to say "June is dairy month and full advantage should be taken for newspaper promotions similar to last year when splendid co-operation was received from the newspapers."

Amos Hubley, director, Dairy Farmers of Canada for P. E. Island, as guest speaker touched briefly on a number of subjects dealing with promotions and extension work as discussed at head office meetings which he had attended.

Mr. Shugg in his campaign for developing merchandising in connection with the dairy business spoke last week at Sussex, Truro and Halifax. He leaves by air this morning for Moncton, Saint John and Fredericton, speaking at each place before dairy products groups.

Ottawa Explains Caribou Plans OTTAWA, (CP)—Federal officials said today they are promoting conservation and better management of the Indian caribou hunt in the north.

They denied a charge by the Alberta Fish and Game Association that the government is promoting a slaughter which could threaten caribou extinction.

They said caribou surveys showed herds were being heavily utilized in areas where the Indian population is large and lightly harvested in others.

The government was therefore assisting Indian hunters, by airplane and other transport, to reach underharvested herds instead of having them kill among heavily-utilized herds close at hand.

The government also was helping Indians to conserve caribou meat by flying to cold-storage lockers. Previously Indians had to store the meat under rocks where wolves could get at it or where it would spoil in summer.
