

Yankees Defeat Tigers; Orioles Drop White Sox

NEW YORK (AP)—New York Yankees moved a step nearer to their third consecutive American League championship Tuesday by defeating Detroit Tigers 7-1 with a six-run explosion in the eighth inning.

The victory padded the Yankees' bulge to 4½ games over Chicago and reduced their magic number to five over the second place White Sox, who lost 7-5 at Baltimore. Any combination of New York victories and Chicago defeats totalling five will clinch the flag for the Yankees, who have nine games left. The White Sox have 12 to play.

Bobby Shantz and Billy Hoeltz waged a fine southpaw duel until the eighth when the Yankees routed Hoeltz with a sudden attack that included five hits, two walks and two Detroit errors.

Hank Bauer opened the assault with a home run, his 18th of the year, and Shantz drove in the last two runs with a single. Elston Howard, who had three of the Yankees' 10 hits including a solo homer in the second inning, contributed a scoring single in the sixth.

Shantz, who hadn't won in ex-

actly a month, turned in one of his best performances of the season.

BALTIMORE (AP)—Baltimore Orioles Tuesday night came from four runs behind to tie the score in the eighth inning and then beat Chicago White Sox 7-5 in the 10th on Buck Niekman's homer.

The setback left the White Sox 6½ games behind the league-leading New York Yankees with 12 games to play.

Niekman's 13th homer in back of Joe Durham's single duplicated long distance hitting by Gus Triandos which had kept the Orioles in the game.

Triandos poled his 17th home run of the season in the fifth inning and his double knocked in the last two of the four Orioles runs in the eighth.

Southpaw Billy Pierce was the victim of the eighth inning uprising as he faltered for the second time in quest of his 20th pitching victory.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Russ Nixon slammed a three-run homer in the second inning to accelerate Cleveland toward a 7-3 victory over Washington Tues-

day night. Ray Narleski allowed nine hits in notching his 11th win.

BOSTON (AP)—Ailing Ted Williams crashed a pinch runner in his first appearance in more than two weeks and Boston Red Sox quickly added another run Thursday night for a 9-3 victory over Kansas City Athletics.

The 39-year-old slugger, sidelined since Sept. 1 with a heavy chest cold, tied the count at 8-3 with his 34th homer to lead off the eighth inning.

Jimmy Piersall then laid down a perfect bunt and advanced to second on a wild pitch. Billy Klauz followed with a run producing single off first baseman Vic Power's glove.

Williams picked out a 2-1 pitch from Kansas City reliever Tom Upton to send a towering blast 400 feet—more than 10 rows into the high field stands.

The hit boosted his American League batting average to .377—an 11 point margin over runner-up Mickey Vernon of New York Yankees. Mantle also has 34 homers.

Braves Defeat Giants; Cards Humble Dodgers

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Henry Aaron slammed his 41st homer of the season and Joe Adcock hit his 10th Tuesday night as Milwaukee Braves beat New York Giants 3-1.

Righthander Bob Trowbridge allowed just five singles as he won his seventh victory against five losses this season.

Aaron doubled and Adcock homered over the leftfield fence in the second inning to account for Milwaukee's first two runs. It was the first home run since June 11 for Adcock, who was out of action from June 23 to Sept. 8 with a broken ankle.

The homer by Aaron in the eighth inning enabled him to tie Ernie Banks of Chicago Cubs for the home run lead in the National League.

CHICAGO (AP)—Three homers, including Ernie Banks' 41st of the season for the lead in both major leagues, Tuesday led Chicago Cubs to a 7-1 triumph over Philadelphia Phils.

The Cubs' Moe Drabowsky not only outpitched Jack Sanford in a

battle between outstanding rookie righthanders, but garnished a slick seven-hit performance with his first home run of his National League career. Bobby Morgan also unloaded a four-bagger for the winners and drove in three runs.

ST. LOUIS (AP)—St. Louis Cardinals, trailing 5-1, broke out with a seven-run seventh inning Tuesday night to rout the defending champion Brooklyn Dodgers, 12-5, and remain three games behind league-leading Milwaukee.

Shaky Brooklyn fielding kept St. Louis in the game until the merry-go-round rally, matching the Cardinals' largest inning of the season.

Then Ed Roebuck walked in the tie-breaking run and Irv Noren followed with a clinching bases-loaded triple, the most damaging of 12 Redbird hits in the game and four in the king-sized seventh.

The victory, St. Louis' eighth in the last nine games and 11th in the most recent 13 starts, boosted the Cards' advantage over the

third-place Dodgers to five games.

New Blood

TORONTO (CP)—The first injection of new blood into the Big Four football league's last-place Toronto Argonauts was announced Tuesday as the club's front office began a wholesale shakeup of players following five straight defeats.

Willie Berzinski, a 24-year-old, two-way halfback cut Monday from the National Football League's Philadelphia Eagles, re-joined in Tuesday.

Coach Hamp Pool said he expected three more players from NFL clubs, at least two of whom will be interior linemen needed desperately to bolster the Argos' dismal blocking and sagging offense.

As word of the new player reinforcements were disclosed by Pool, managing director Lew Hayman announced that import Art Powell had been cut from the squad.

Hayman said Powell had come to him and "asked that he be let go in the interests of the club and himself."

Powell, a flanker and defensive halfback from San Jose State College, has been a great disappointment to Pool and his coaching staff. He played an exceptionally poor game in Argos' 45-1 loss against Montreal Alouettes Saturday and was criticized for not showing any desire and effort.

Hayman said that there'll be a "general exodus" of players this week in an attempt to strengthen the club. The ones going are the players who haven't produced for Argus, he said.

Film Shows Role Of Queen

LONDON (Reuters)—A television film prepared to give Americans an idea of the Queen's role in Britain and the Commonwealth was shown to reporters here Tuesday.

The film, Transatlantic Television, has been released in the United States, where it will be screened by more than 140 stations in advance of the Queen's visit to Canada and the U.S. Oct. 12-21.

The 28-minute film, produced by the government, gives viewers an easy-to-grasp lesson in British constitutional history and the rights and duties of the Crown under that constitution.

It begins with scenes from the Queen's coronation in 1953, shows her at various public engagements—visiting children's hospitals, presenting football trophies, opening the Australian Parliament, meeting screen stars.

There also are a couple of more casual sequences—the Queen excitedly watching a horse race and one of her vacationing with Prince Charles and Princess Anne.

In a relaxed manner, Australian Prime Minister Robert Menzies explains how the Queen can be head of a Commonwealth which includes republics and how she carries out her duties as Queen in a country such as Australia.

Krupp Leaves For Canada To Investigate Ungava Ore

ESSEN, Germany (Reuters)—Alfried Krupp, head of the Essen steel dynasty, left here by air Tuesday night for Montreal to discuss the possibility of developing iron ore deposits in the Ungava Bay region of northern Quebec.

Krupp will meet Quebec Premier Duplessis and Canadian-born U.S. industrialist Cyrus Eaton before continuing on to the United States to attend an international meeting on conference a San Francisco Oct. 14-18.

Though Krupp will go to Ungava Bay to "see for himself," a spokesman said, he also is going to "make contacts, meet Canadian industrialists and size up future economic possibilities."

The spokesman said the Ungava Iron Ore Company, owned by Eaton and a combination of German firms, has been set up to investigate the mining possibilities.

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Reds Welcome At Games

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States said Tuesday that all Olympic athletes and officials—including those of Communist China—are welcome to the 1960 Olympic winter games at Squaw Valley, Calif.

All they have to do, the state department said, is be certified as genuine athletes by their national olympic groups, and pass health and security tests under U.S. law. They won't have to be fingerprinted.

The announcement got the U.S. of a propaganda hot spot just three days before an international meeting in Bulgaria to draft plans for the event.

The security requirement still left a question mark, but officials insisted there are "no gimmicks."

ANOTHER COUNTRY

There had been speculation that the 1960 winter games would be moved to another country unless the U.S. found a way around its immigration law's blanket ban on visits by Communists.

This ban can be waived by the secretary of state and the attorney-general provided they find it in the national interest to do so. Similarly, under an amendment passed by Congress this year, fingerprinting of visitors can be waived.

The letter noted that U.S. immigration law also requires visitors to pass a health and security test.

Officials said they expect little trouble with either. They said the names submitted will be weighed against intelligence information about known Red agents. Presumably any out-and-out agents would be barred.

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Expect Vote Will Favor Ferries Strike

OTTAWA (CP)—A top union official said Tuesday he anticipates that employees of the Newfoundland steamship service operated by the CNR will vote "overwhelmingly" for strike action next week.

W. J. Smith, national president of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees CLC, said, however, a strike will not be called until the federal government has an opportunity to review the dispute.

A walkout would bring about the most serious disruption in federal transportation services since the Progressive Conservative government took office June 20.

Mr. Smith said at a press conference that he has authorized distribution of strike ballots to start at midnight Friday. The result of the vote was expected to be known within the following week.
