BERMUDA WELCOMES VISITORS

The following is taken from The Bermuda Newspaper, The Royal Gazette, when Mr. and Mrs. Bell were on recent holiday there.

From the "million-acre farm" of Prince Edward Island in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, Mr. and Mrs. R. Reginald Bell have come to the island of Bermuda for a rest following a strenuous ses-

sion in the province's legislature. They are staying at "Rosodon." Mr. Bell is leader of the Conservative (opposition) Party in the House. There are 30 members in the Legislature, elected every four or five years.

An election is due this year. "I am hopeful of a change," says Mr. Bell.

There are some great similarities as well as definite differences between our island and Prince Edward. The islands are somewhat similar in shape, but Prince Edward is 140 miles long and ranges in width from four to 40 miles. Up north large motor cars are the rule, and the small English cars are just beginning to come in.

Unlike our land, Prince Edward Island, with its red soil atop the base of red sandstone, is 85 per cent under cultivation. Next to farming the largest industry is fishing, and then comes the comparatively recent tourist trade.

Mr. Bell, who has been in the Legislature continuously since 1943, said that his party's platform is mainly for the betterment of aid to agriculture and fisheries and the development of the tourist industry. The tourist industry is largely trade from New England and New York.

"It is a short season," said Mr. Bell, "with the summer hotels only open during July and August. There is a car ferry to the mainland, about 10 miles away. Air transport has also increased the tourist trade. There is a project to link the island to the mainland by a 10-mile causeway, which is expected to cost \$100 million. If built, this

will be the longest causeway in the world."

A lawyer by profession, busy Mr. Bell is a farmer, with 800 acres of land on which he raises Scotch Shorthorns as beef cattle, and 150 Holsteins for dairy cattle. In his third career, that of politician, he was official leader of the Conservative Party in Prince Edward from 1950 to 1958. He resigned because of the pressure of other affairs and is now the official House leader of the party.

Mr. Bell intends to visit the House of Assembly in session and asked if we had a party system here.

There are only the two parties in Prince Edward—Conservative and Liberal.

Mrs. Bell, said her husband, is interested in welfare work, such as Red Cross activities. The couple have two children—a son, Rogers, who is a student at the University of New Brunswick, and a 14-year-old daughter who attends the Edgehill School for Girls in Windsor, Nova Scotia.
