Bass Fishing May Be N.S. Tourist Bait

Nova Scotia is angling for another major tourist attraction—surf fishing for striped bass in Canada's ocean playground—and a railroad surveyor is helping plot the course for its success.

"The striped bass is one of the gamest fish ever hooked. It's wary, a good fighter, and it's a real accomplishment to land one," says Bob Miller, assistant land surveyor for the CNR's Atlantic region and a native of Bridgewater, N.S. An authority on striped bass, he's been plugging for its development as an attraction of the Atlantic provinces for some time.

"The sports fishery has great potential in the Maritimes," says Mr. Miller. "There are more than ten million salt water fishermen in the United States, and they are very dedicated."

This arrangement has been made with the concurrence of premier-elect Alex Campbell.

URGES BOMBING

CAM LO, South Viet Nam (Reuters) — Premier Nguyen Cao Ky said Thursday the U.S. should increase its bombing of North Viet Nam, including the main cities of Hanoi and Haiphong, if the North Vietnamese government carries out threats to execute captured U.S. flyers as war criminals.
