A CITY OF THE DEAD.

Impressions of a Recent Visit - The McKenna Monument

It is good to see God's acre beautiful because of the reverence we should feel for the consecrated ground in which lie all that remains of those loved on earth; it is good to see the spot that should be dedicated to meditation, to prayer, to recollection and to hope beautiful through the tenderness which faith generates in our hearts. It is true that monuments and flowers do not make the dead rest more peacefully on the day of resurrection the monument, whether a dome of granite or a mound of earth, will be as nothing. Yet, in common decency, we should care for the graves of that glorious army who died fortified by the sacraments, who will rise again our brothers in the love of Jesus Christ. When we lay the precious remains of our beloved beneath the clay, when the ceremonies, significant beyond expression, have been finished by the minister of God, we love to mark the new-made grave with the sign of our redemption, because every earthly cross ends with the grave and because we hope that those who sleep beneath may rise to a life of joy in the Kingdom of God's glory.

Our own Catholic cemetery of Charlottetown is a magnificent "City of the Dead." Beautiful it is with the beauty of a perfect dream, and solemn as the hour after death. As we walk through it we feel the presence of that power before which prince and peasant must bow down, and as we read the inscriptions on the magnificent monuments with which it is filled we seem to realize that our faith still binds the living and the dead with golden chains around the feet of God, that we ourselves shall pass away and sleep with them beneath the sod, we know not how, or when, or where; and as we think of what will be we can but say:
Leaves have their time to fall,
And flowers to wither at the north wind's breath,
And stars to set—but all,
Thou hast all seasons for thine own,
O, Death.

A splendid Celtic cross monument has just been erected there by Mr. Francis McKenna to the memory of his sister Catherine. It stands 14 feet high, and is built of Barrie dark granite beautifully polished and exquisitely interlaced and carved with rare old Celtic ornamentation. The front, back, sides and wheel bear the symbols of the Catholic faith. Eternity without beginning and without end, the four evangelists, the eight beatitudes and the adorable Trinity are represented, cut deep into the stone and polished, the back ground being left untouched so as to give sufficient shadow to throw out the ornamentation. The name "F. McKenna," in the panel in the front and back of the second base, is in 5-inch letters raised three-eighths of an inch from back of panel. The surfaces polished, the back ground is left to represent light cut work inscription of the late Catherine McKenna, sunk in Gothic block letters, guided in a first-class manner. The stem of the cross diminishes on the front, back and sides from 1 foot 2 inches square at the bottom to 10 inches at the centre line of wheel. It is certainly the most elaborate piece of granite work ever done in this country, and reflects credit on Mr. E. J. Duffy, who designed it, and on Mr. Robert Reid, of Montreal, by whom it was executed.

Take a walk through our cemetery. The names of those you perhaps knew and loved, emblazoned in every shade, and relief and color, are around you to tell who sleeps beneath. Here are the graves of the rich and poor, the young and old; here a strong man is weeping as he reads an epitaph, there a loving friend is placing a wreath of flowers, while just around this tomb a little girl is lost in tearful prayer over her mother's grave. Around you are the ensigns of faith—crosses, hearts and anchors, texts of scripture, couplets of poetry, words expressive of endearment, bereavement and sympathy, and high above all stands this magnificent Celtic cross bearing the symbols of our faith and creed. I love to walk through our "City of the Dead," the silent resting place of the judged of God, where the cross stands at every mound, where the moon-beams brightly flit like faith conquering doubt, where ever and anon, as the breeze sweeps by making wistful melody the voices of the dead seem speaking golden truths or begging the charity of our fervent prayers. Yes, I love to walk through that silent city, and meditate on what was, what is, and what is to be; and when I wake from my reverie I feel myself a better Christian, loving all the more Him who said, "I am the resurrection and the life," and craving all the more trustfully for light perpetual for the souls of the faithful departed.
