Cholera Amongst Pilgrims.

LONDON, Dec. 30.  
It is reported that a serious outbreak of Cholera has taken place amongst pilgrims in the districts lying between Mecca and Medina.

C. P. R. Syndicate.

MONTREAL, Dec. 30.  
It is rumored that the Canadian Pacific Railway Syndicate has obtained a promise of all the money required—seventy-five million dollars. This creates a great boom in the stock market.

Zululand.

LONDON, Dec. 30.  
It has been decided to divide Zululand into two districts, reserving that portion through which the Tugla river runs. John Dunn and the native Chiefs are averse to Cetewayo being reinstated King of Zululand. Europeans will not be allowed to hold farms on either of the two new divisions.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

COLOGNE, Dec. 28.  
There seems to be a ceaseless down pour of rain. The Rhine has risen 90 centimetres during the night, flooding the lower town and part of the quay.

BERLIN, Dec. 28.  
The Rhine and tributaries from Lake Constance to Cologne continue to rise rapidly; many bridges and banks of dams have been destroyed. A bridge near Lorrach in Baden gave way and twenty persons were drowned.

DUBLIN, Dec. 28.  
"United Ireland" was to-day issued for the first time since its seizure.

LONDON, Dec. 28.  
Her Majesty's ship "Undine" has captured eight slave dhows off Comers Islands, on the east coast of Africa.

BRANFORD, ENG., Dec. 28.  
This morning a tall chimney fell upon a building full of operatives many of whom are believed to have been killed.

LATER.—Thirty-six persons are now known to have been killed and fifty others injured, mostly women and children. Owing to the amount of debris the exact number killed cannot be learned for two or three days. Total damage is estimated at over £60,000. About 300 persons were thrown out of employment.

LONDON, Dec. 24.  
A proclamation published in the London Gazette summons Parliament to meet February 15th.
