### University Enrolment In N.S. Expected To Show Increase

HALIFAX (CP) — Eight universities and colleges in Nova Scotia have received more than 10,000 applications for enrolment this term and the eventual total is expected to be greater still. Dalhousie University here is expected to enrol at least 4,000 students, an increase of 600 over last year. The enrolment of 3,400 in the 1964-65 year was an 18 per cent increase over the previous university year.

St. Francis Xavier University of Antigonish and its branch at Sydney — Xavier College — expect to keep total enrolment below 2,000 again this year, although a few more students may attend Xavier College. Last year, the combined enrolment was over 1,900 "and we're trying to keep it about the same," a spokesman said.

Acadia University at Wolfville, N.S., expects 1,450 — 1,500 students this year, compared to 1,311 enrolled a year ago. Both Acadia and St. FX are in the midst of expansion schemes.

An increase of 300 students is expected at St. Mary's University here which last year was attended by 1,000 students. It is a Roman Catholic University run by Jesuit priests.

"Very little change" is expected in the student population at Nova Scotia Technical College, which last year had 375 undergraduates and 70-80 graduate students.

The university of Kings College here, with 250 students and some financial worries last year, expects to enrol over 300 this term. Enrolment at Saint Ann's College, Church Point,

N.S., is expected to remain steady at about 240 to 250 students. Mount St. Vincent University in suburban-Rockingham expects about 200 more students this year, with a projected total of about 800 for the 1965-66 year.

(Continued from page 1) they chased and caught a theoretical satellite. This opened the way for the Gemini 6 spacecraft to try docking with another satellite, Russia, without a manoeuvrable craft to date, has done nothing in this area.

National aeronautics and space administration officials are cautious in predicting who now is ahead in the moon race. Asked whether he thinks Gemini 5 would close the gap Dr. George E. Mueller, associate administrator, said:

"We're pursuing a course that we hope will provide the United States with leadership in manned space flight. This is a step. I don't think any one flight or achievement is going to determine leadership in space." The Soviet Union's top scientific administrator indicated this week that Russia could be hedging in he race.

Dr. Mikhail Keldysh deplored "the exaggerated interest in the world" in putting a man on the moon. He said it is to early for Russia to set a realistic date. The U.S. has set a 1969 target for its first Apollo manned lunar landing.

BIGGER ROCKETS The Soviet lead has been based primarily on rocket power, a field in which the U.S. is rapidly gaining ground. The U.S. has fired more powerful rockets than the 1,400,000-pound-thrust Russian booster, but they have not been tested thoroughly enough to trust man's life aboard them.

The recent Russian launch of a 26,800-pound satellite indicates the Russians are working on a new booster in the 3,000,000-pound thrust class. However, American experts feel the Russians do not have anything in the works as mammoth as the Saturn 5 being groomed for Apollo moon voyages. It will produce 7,500,000 pounds of thrust and shoot men directly to the moon. First tests are scheduled for 1967.

The Russians have indicated they will use several smaller rockets to assemble a moon launching pad in orbit about the earth.

## General Investment Buying 60 Per Cent

MONTREAL (CP) — The General Investment Corp. is buying a 60-per-cent share in Marine Industries Ltd., of Sorel, Que., and will sell two of its present concerns to the Sorel firm.

The General Investment concerns involved are Forano Ltd., a manufacturer of wood-handling equipment in Pléssiville, 50 miles southwest of Quebec City, and Volcano Ltd., a maker of heating equipment, located in St. Hyacinthe, 30 miles east of Montreal.

The new three-company organization represents an annual sales volume of \$50,000,000. The share transfers become effective Oct. 1.

General Investment is financed both by the Quebec government and private investors. Its purpose is to stimulate industrial development of Quebec. It announced the new transaction Thursday.

No purchase figure for the Marine Industries shares was disclosed, but an unofficial estimate said it was \$12,000,000.

Marine Industries has been owned by the Simard family of Sorel, a community 40 miles northeast of Montreal.

BUILDS SHIPS Marine is active in dredging and shipbuilding, and in the construction of railway freight cars, turbines, alternators, furnaces and other such products. It has a shipyard and factory facilities in Sorel, employing 2,500 persons.

A. Ludger Simard, president of Marine, said in a statement that his family, retaining 40 per cent of the capital, will be represented on the company's board of directors.

Rene Pare, president of General Investment, said the transaction was part of the corporation's attempt to ensure the smooth transition of enterprises from family to public ownership.

He said General Investment also has been urging the "necessity of grouping into larger, more effective units."

Escapes Draw Prison Terms

FREDERICTON (CP) — Four inmates of the New Brunswick Central Reformatory who escaped Aug. 16 have been sentenced to terms in penitentiary.

Maurice Dube, 21, of Blue River, Que., who was captured by RCMP Thursday night in a barn near here was sentenced to two years on two charges of breaking, entering and theft, two counts of car theft and one of theft.

He received an additional three months for escaping custody and also must serve the 10-week unexpired portion of his reformatory term.

Three fellow escapees were sentenced Thursday to similar terms on a total of 21 charges of breaking, entering and theft, car theft and escaping custody.

They also must serve the unexpired portions of their previous sentences.

They are Stewart Brea, 21, of Nequac, N.B., Arthur Mazouze, 21, of St. Rose, N.B., and 18-year-old Joseph Robichaud, also of St. Rose.

Messy Record Against Liberals Suggests Dief

OTTAWA (CP) — Opposition Leader Diefenbaker predicted Friday that public opinion will rise up against the Liberals' "messy" record on morality in government at the next election.

The Conservative leader, back from a five-day sving through Quebec's Eastern Townships, said his party will wage a "positive campaign" but he made clear that the morality issue will loom large.

"There's an over-riding feeling across this country that never in a period of two and a half years has there been such a series of messes that have to be cleaned up."

"These things transcend party feelings," he told an impromptu press conference on his return from Knowlton, Que.

Mr. Diefenbaker said Prime Minister Pearson is "subject to the direction" of Keith Davey, national Liberal director, and several cabinet ministers who want an election in November before redistribution of constituencies can be completed.

He said Mr. Pearson's contention that an election with the new electoral map will not be possible until 1968 is a "sheer political invention."

## Official Gives Reasons For Anger Of Taxpayers

BATHURST, N. B. (CP) — County Administrator A.R. Barton said Friday two factors have contributed to the disgruntlement of Shippeagan and Miscou Island taxpayers, over their 1965 tax bills.

One reason, he said, is that Gloucester County applied a \$307,000 surplus last year to offset what would have been a 10 per cent increase in tax bills. Since bills this year reflect both the normal 1964 and 1965 budget increases, tax bills are up about 20 per cent.

The second reason, said Mr. Barton, is that a revaluation program has shifted the taxation burden from personal property to buildings.

Buildings in Shippeagan Parish had borne 48.4 per cent of the tax load and personal property 51.6 per cent. After revaluation, buildings now bear 63.3 per cent of the load and personal property 36.5 per cent.

"The problem of revaluation is being faced in many communities in New Brunswick," said Mr. Barton. "The situation here has just been made worse because of the surplus situation last year."

Mr. Barton also said he doesn't intend to return tax bills rejected by a large part of the Shippeagan Parish population which were presented to him Thursday by a protest delegation.

EXPECTED TO PAY He said the bills will be analyzed but the people who returned the bills know what their taxes are and are expected to pay them.

Members of the delegation which marched on the Gloucester County court house were protesting tax increases which in some cases were double and more what they paid last year.

At the court house Thursday, Mr. Barton told the demonstrators that Gloucester County is in financial difficulty and the bank's refusal to extend further credit forced the sale of debentures to wipe out the county debt. This had led to the increase in taxes.

"There is no immediate solution to this problem," said Mr. Barton. He told the delegation that only the New Brunswick Legislature can implement recommendations of the Byrne Report aimed at lowering the level of property taxation.

After meeting with Mr. Barton, the approximately 150 Miscou Island and Shippeagan taxpayers said that unless a satisfactory solution is proposed to their tax problem in six days they would march on Fredericton.

Mr. Barton said he would put the plight of the area's taxpayers before the provincial government.

About 90 per cent of the tax bills sent to residents of the protesting communities were returned to Mr. Barton in a box. A petition objecting to the level of taxation and signed by about 800 persons was presented to Mr. Barton by Calixte Chiasson of Lameque.

Medical Paper Is Published

A medical paper dealing with tuberculin testing which was prepared by Dr. Ernie M. Friend, director of the division tuberculosis control of the provincial department of health, was used in full in the most recent issue of the important Canadian Journal of Public Health.

Delivered earlier this year at the Dalhousie School of Nursing Institute for nurses in tuberculosis and respiratory diseases, the paper discusses fully the various means of tuberculin testing as a diagnostic and once finding tool.

Dr. Friend stated the objective was to find the maximum number of cases before they developed symptoms and before they infect others.

He concludes with the quoted statement: "Tuberculosis cannot be considered to be eliminated as a public health problem unless the number of children who become infected before the age of 11 falls below one per cent." He adds, no country today satisfies this condition.

False Report Draws \$50 Fine

Roger Reginald Fall, of Parkdale was fined \$50 and costs when he pleaded guilty before Magistrate James B. Johnston in Queen's County Magistrate's Court yesterday afternoon to a charge of reporting an offense to the police when in fact no offence had been committed.

John Charles Hyde of Cornwall pleaded not guilty to a charge of unlawfully causing a disturbance and not guilty to turning off the highway in a unsafe manner. Both cases were adjourned until Sept. 10 to set a date for trial.

Ernest William Arsenault of 105-Upper Queen Street pleaded guilty to unlawfully causing a disturbance and was fined \$20 and costs.

There were seven cases of illegal possession of liquor on the docket. Five of the accused were fined \$20 and costs, one was fined \$25 and costs and another was fined \$10 and costs.
