When they ceased active use of the building it became a target for boys, and possibly older persons who broke most of the windows and carried away timbers and bolts. At the request of officers of the Community Centre, the Department of Public Works was asked to take over the building and protect it. The Department was informed that the Community Centre could not raise the money necessary to complete the sale.
(5.) No. Property was sold for balance owing plus interest.
(6.) Approximately 500 acres.
(7.) (a) No.
(b) It is not a policy of Government to pay property taxes, unless a revenue is derived therefrom. (Early summer of 1956 the Trustees of Mt. Pleasant School approached the Department requesting a lease agreement in respect to the airport property from which they hoped to supplement the revenue for the school by collecting pasturage fees for livestock. This agreement was processed that year and the first year's rent of \$50.00 paid. None has been paid for the past two years and no effort was made to do so. During this period a large number of cattle and sheep have been pastured on this land.)

Hail Insurance Shows Decline
OTTAWA (CP) - Life insurance put into effect in Canada in 1958 rose to \$5,129,674,028, an increase of 3.92 per cent over 1957, the federal department of insurance reported Tuesday.
The department said net insurance premiums written in Canada in 1958 for fire, automobile, personal accident and sickness, personal property, and public liability insurance also showed increases. However, premiums written for hail insurance declined.
