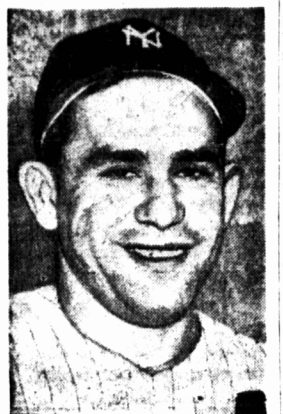


Berra And Turley Lead Yank Win Over Boston

American League pitchers fired three shutouts and Yogi Berra produced his long-awaited fireworks a day ahead of the fourth of July Wednesday as New York Yankees opened a three-game lead over Chicago White Sox.

In the National League, St. Louis Cardinals renewed their bid for first place with a 5-4 victory over Chicago Cubs. The Cards trailed Cincinnati by a half game pending the Redlegs' night game with Milwaukee, also 1/2 back. Washington met Baltimore in an AL night game.

Berra, shackled by a slump all season, broke out with eight runs batted in on two singles, his 12th homer and a ground out in Bob

Turley's 10-0, three-hit decision over Boston Red Sox. The Yanks' first-place margin rose to three over Chicago when the White Sox were stopped by Kansas City, 5-0 behind the combined five-hit pitching of Virgil Trucks, who won his seventh, and Tom Morgan.

FIRST SHUTOUT

To make the blanks complete, lefthander Don Mossi of Cleveland Indians, turned in his first major league shutout, a 6-0 romp over struggling Detroit.

Del Emnis, on an RBI tear with 10 in his last five games, hit a two-run single in the seventh to break a 3-3 tie and win for the Cardinals at Chicago. Larry Jackson, named Wednesday to the NL's all star pitching staff, won his 10th against four losses with help from Hoyt Wilhelm in the ninth.

Al Dark had a 4-for-5 day for the cards, who've won their last four. Tom Poholsky, former Card, was the loser.

Berra, hitting only 225 with a mere 28 RBI before the Boston game, drove in seven of his eight runs in the first three innings, twice after Mickey Mantle—battling ahead of him—was walked intentionally. His homer, hit with two on, was the 250th of his career. Turley allowed three singles, for his second 1957 shutout. Tom Brewer, 1-9 lifetime with New York, lost it.

The Yanks now are 18-3 in their current push and their latest win streak stands at seven.

Trucks went 5 1-3 innings and Morgan 3 2-3 against the White Sox, with Morgan preserving the

shutout by coming in to get Jim Rivera to hit into a bases-loaded doubleplay in the sixth. Billy Hunter and Lou Skizas hit home runs to cost Dick Donovan his third loss in 11 decisions.

The A's Billy Martin was hit on the left wrist by a Donovan pitch in the first inning. X-rays showed no fracture and Martin is expected to be able to play in a few days.

Mossi, converted to a starter to bolster Cleveland's crippled pitching staff, scattered six Detroit hits for a 6-2 record. Duke Maas, losing his seventh, permitted nine hits, including Chico Carrasquel's sixth homer, and a two-run single by Russ Nixon. The victory boosted Cleveland into third place, a half game ahead of Boston.

TORONTO (CP)—It has become automatic the last two years for Edmonton's Normie Kwong to be voted the outstanding Canadian football player in the country. Things might be a little different this season.

The big gun in the "Shamrocks" was catcher, Jack Shepherd, who went four for five, including a long shot in the first that cleared the left field bank but was called back for a ground rule double. Allan (Junior) MacLeod, poled the longest ball of the night in the second inning with one mate aboard that went for a home run. The fielding gem of the night was pulled off by Leonard Bagole of the "Shamrocks" who hauled down a sure hit into deep left field with his back to the plate.

Both Kwong and James had tremendous years in 1955. James smashed the Western Interprovincial Football Union record but Kwong topped it with 1,220 yards gained rushing and was voted outstanding Canadian.

James, then 21, turned to pro hockey with the Leafs after the 1955 football season and Kwong, the only Chinese in Canadian pro football, grabbed the headlines and the honor in 1956. He rolled up a record-breaking 1,437 yards rushing last season for his best year since he started his big-time career with Calgary Stampeders in 1948.

Don't be surprised if Canada's two leading golfers on the tournament trail—Stan Leonard of Vancouver and Lachue, Que., and Al Baiding of Toronto—clean up close to \$50,000 this year. Right now, their total earnings for 1957 are close to \$20,000.

The 42-year-old Leonard has collected \$10,157.83, including \$2,000 first-place money in the Greensboro, N.C. Open last April. He has 10 years younger, his son, won \$9,328.65 with \$1,200 of this coming from his championships winning golf in the Miami Beach Open in March.

Last year Leonard won \$7,291 and Baiding \$3,610.

Roger MacLeod so far this season has been doing just so-so his control has been bad and he has walked almost as many batters as he has struck out.
