REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.

Harrison Nominated By a Great Majority.

Reid For Vice-President.

MINNEAPOLIS, June 11.

The result of the first ballot was to nominate HARRISON. The vote for Harrison was 533, McKinley, 182, Blaine, 182, Reid, 4, Lincoln, 1. The proceedings throughout were characterized by great excitement. Much enthusiasm was displayed by the friends of the respective candidates. Harrison's nomination was then made unanimous.

PRESBYTERIAN NEWS.

The General Assembly.

MONTREAL, June 11.

The Assembly yesterday dealt with the home missions of the western section. Four Presbyteries were formed into the synod of British Columbia. Rev. Edward Grant presented the report of the aged and infirm ministers fund. For the eastern section the total receipts were \$3,509. There are eighteen ministers on the fund, the largest allowance being \$200 per year. The profits of the hymnal yielded the eastern section for this fund the sum of \$488. Young ministers were urged to connect themselves with the fund. The evening was devoted to foreign missions. A deficit of over \$8,000 exists in the foreign mission funds, and the Assembly asks \$128,000 for the ensuing year.

Dominion Parliament.

OTTAWA, June 11.

The House devoted the whole day to the criminal law bill. They passed from section 407 to 511.

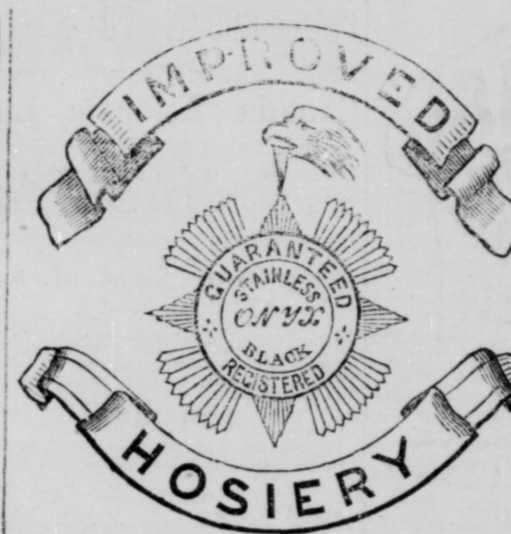
