NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

LONDON, Oct. 30.

The St. Petersburg Gazette says rumors are persistently current that the Government has decided to offer active assistance to Shere Ali. Many volunteers are preparing to start for Afghanistan. By order of the High Admiral 110 torpedo boats were distributed among the ships.

A Vienna telegram says England confidentially directs the attention of Austria to the serious aspect of affairs in Turkey, but has not made a direct attempt to bring about common action by the Powers, although she has brought forward the matter individually at St. Petersburg.

A Simla despatch states that telegraphic correspondence is proceeding with the home authorities. The Indian officials appear disappointed with the instructions from the home office, and it is rumored that the Viceroy is instructed to write the Ameer again before advancing.

The Begum of Chopal has offered to place her army at the disposal of England.

BERLIN, Oct. 30.

The Russian General, Lonakine, has started from the eastern shore of the Caspian Sea in the direction of Mero, near the northern frontier of Afghanistan, one account says to punish marauding inhabitants.

LONDON, Oct. 30.

Intelligence from Whydah, west coast of Africa, Sept. 26th, states that the Portuguese Commandant and seven soldiers are held captives by the King of Dahomey, who makes them parade before him daily. The King has recommenced the custom of human sacrifices; five hundred persons were slaughtered in one month.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 30.

The Porte asked Prince Lobanoff to explain the return of Russian troops to positions recently evacuated by them, and also their refusal to re-instate Turkish authorities in the district between Tchornon and Adrianople. Sixty thousand Russians have entered Roumelia by way of Bourias.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 30.

The "Golos" says if the Russian people were consulted, they would unhesitatingly decide for a renewal of the struggle. Despite the expediency of diplomacy to arrest the natural course of historical development, it is evident that an inevitable crisis in the eastern question has arrived, and there is no apparent prospect of completing the organization of the Balkan Peninsula on the basis of humanity and justice without a fresh war.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 30.

The Porte has learned that Gen. Todleben has arrived at Lule Bourges, and ordered the repair of the bridges and the construction of barracks for winter quarters.

The Porte at the instance of France and Italy expresses its willingness to make a slight rectification of the frontier in favor of Greece, but it is thought here that Greece will refuse any boundary other than that indicated in the Conference at Berlin. Meanwhile Turkey and Greece continue in hostile preparation.

VIENNA, Oct. 30.

In the Lower House of the Reichsrath to-day the reporter of the Budget Committee moved that the discussion of the Government bill for the issue of 25,000,000 florins, gold rents, to cover the expenses of the Bosnian occupation be postponed for the present, and the Government meanwhile be requested to lay the treaty of Berlin before the House immediately for discussion. The Budget Committee, in the sitting when it decided upon this action, adopted a resolution that the treaty ought to have been submitted to the House before the occupation was undertaken, while the Finance Minister maintained that the delegations alone were competent to discuss the foreign policy.

LONDON, Oct. 30.

Mrs. Fitzwilliam, moderate Liberal, has been elected to Parliament for Peterboro.

DUBLIN, Oct. 30.

The obsequies of Cardinal Cullen, yesterday, in the Cathedral were solemn and impressive and were attended by an immense gathering, including all the bishops of Ireland and 600 priests. There was no sermon, but a panegyric will be preached by Father Tom Burke. Bishop Moran, nephew of the Cardinal, pronounced the absolution. The coffin was borne out to the vault while the Benedictus was chanting; holy water was sprinkled on the coffin, which was placed in the vault.

MADRID, Oct. 30.

The trial of Juan Moncasi has commenced. He refused legal assistance, and an advocate was appointed by the Court to defend him. It is considered proved that he had no accomplices. It is believed the King will commute the sentence of death, which will doubtless be passed, to penal servitude for life.

A committee of the Constitutional party was formed very shortly after the meeting of the Cortes, to test the question of defeat, one which would compel the resignation of the Cabinet. The Government, however, is confident of a majority.

LONDON, Oct. 30.

A special from Madrid says dispatches have been exchanged with Paris, Vienna, Berlin and Rome with a view to common legislation against Socialism.

LONDON, Oct. 30.

The British bark Annie Williams, Capt.

Moore, from Glasson Dock, Sept. 2nd, by way of Queenstown, Sept. 21st, for Oak Point, Restigonche, put back to Holyhead, and reports that on the 12th Oct., lat. 46, lon. 33, she saw a steamer apparently disabled, bark rigged with a black funnel, standing eastward under sail. It is thought it may be the Belgian steamer Hermana Ludwig, Capt. Durt, which left New York Sept. 28th for Antwerp, and which has not yet reached her destination.

The North of England Carriage and Iron Company has failed. Liabilities believed to be heavy.

GENEVA, Oct. 30.

Twenty one Cantons accepted the scheme for the completion of the St. Gethard Railway.

VIENNA, Oct. 30.

Baron Von Pretis Caghodo has relinquished the formation of a Cabinet because of the impossibility of securing a combination commanding a majority of the Reichsrath.

LONDON, Oct. 30.

A Glasgow despatch says the Directors and other officials of the Glasgow Bank were, this afternoon, committed for trial on charges of fraud and theft. They must now be tried within a hundred and twenty days. The friends of the prisoners are making every exertion to secure their liberty. The relations of John Stewart, one of the Directors, offered \$500,000 bail, but the acceptance of bail is not obligatory in cases of theft. Some gentlemen prominently connected with the Bank have disappeared.

Thomson & Nephews, timber merchants at Grangemouth, have failed. Liabilities heavy.

There has been a slight fall of snow here; and there is considerable snow in various parts of the country.

A Rome despatch reports that Cardinal John Howard, a native of England, nominated in 1877, has been offered and declined the Archbishopric of Dublin as the successor to Cardinal Cullen.

LONDON, Oct. 30.

A Copenhagen despatch says the political difficulties in the way of the marriage of the Duke of Cumberland with the Princess Thyra have been removed.

A Berlin despatch says: "If the Duke of Cumberland shall retract the manifesto issued after his father's death in which he asserts his right to the Crown of Hanover, Prussia will surrender him to the Guelph money."

PESTH, Oct. 30.

In the Lower House of the Hungarian Diet to-day a resolution was offered by the Extreme Left proposing the impeachment of the Ministry.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31—1. a.m.

A London special says that silver is steadily raising at 50 1-9d. per oz. The Australian Government is in the market making large purchases. Money is becoming more abundant and financial prospects are brightening.
