Alex. Sullivan's Career.

SAID TO HAVE BEEN BORN IN CANADA—HIS PREVIOUS TRIAL FOR THE MURDER OF FRANCIS HANFORD.

Alexander Sullivan claims to have been born in Maine, but his brothers say that he first saw the light in Amherstburg, Ontario.

In 1870 he had a shooting scrape with H. H. Heath, secretary of the territory, and, though arrested, was acquitted.

Francis Hanford, an estimable gentleman, who had been assistant superintendent of schools, was reduced to the position of principal of a north side school.

The unprovoked murder created a tremendous sensation. The Bible had recently been removed from the public schools, and the Protestants blamed the Roman Catholics for it.

On a second trial he was acquitted. After the first trial it was freely said that the Clan-na-Gael, of which he was a member, had been used to help Sullivan out of his scrape.

In 1879 Sullivan took advantage of the national bankrupt law, then about to go out of existence. He was one of the several hundred who filed at the last moment to get rid of their obligations.

In 1884 he took the stump for Blaine. Since then he has not exerted himself

much except in Irish affairs, and to have Patrick Egan appointed minister to Chili. Egan is a member of the executive of the Clan-na-Gael, an organization charged in the verdict of the coroner's jury with harboring murderers and affording opportunity for conspiracy to murder.
