Federal Member For Queens Sees Conservative Landslide

Speaking to PC electors at French River last Wednesday evening, Heath Macquarrie, M.P. for Queens, said that the Province of P.E.I. depended on Ottawa for 80 per cent of its revenue. He said that since 1957 the Island had received more money from Ottawa per capita than any other Province of Canada.

Other speakers included Walter R. Shaw, provincial leader of the PC party and Frank Myers, first district PC candidate. The meeting was chaired by Arthur Stewart.

The Premier termed the Ottawa agreements a stupid arrangement but was not adverse to spending the monies handed over, Mr. Macquarrie declared.

SWEEP SEEN

The federal representative said that earlier he had thought the election would go 25-5 in favor of the Conservatives, but he was now extremely doubtful that the Liberals would win even five seats.

He termed the 24-year-old Liberal regime "the antique skeleton of the dark ages."

Mr. Shaw said that the provincial hospital insurance plan was not made compulsory by Ottawa but by the provincial Liberal administration. The only man to actually mention sales tax in relation to hospital insurance was the Premier himself.

The provincial PC leader denied opposition statements which intimated that the federal cow was dry. He asserted that on the contrary there was a great deal of milk in the same pot that the special Atlantic Provinces grant came from.

NEW MARKETS

Following the election of a PC government on September 1 steps would be taken to establish a market for Island products in South America, northeast Quebec, Labrador and Newfoundland, he said.

Mr. Shaw also asserted that the potato flake factory promised by the Premier was already set-up in Alliston, Ontario.

Mr. Cullen's contention that the farmers were coming to see him in droves might very well be true, Mr. Shaw said. "If they didn't visit his office they would never see him," he added.

Which government would be able to secure the best co-operation from Ottawa, a hostile government or one in line with the federal administration? the PC leader asked.

PAYING BULK

Mr. Myers said that the federal government was paying 90 per cent of the cost of the Hillsboro Bridge job. So far as the provincial hospital plan was concerned, it appeared to him that "the brass had forgotten the grass" he said. This was not surprising in view of the fact that the Liberals had been allowed to remain twenty-five years in office.

In regard to hospital insurance, the only member of the Legislature to mention sales tax was the Premier himself, Mr. Myers maintained.

Conservative strength was shown by the tremendous turnout at each PC meeting, he declared. In arrogance some Island Liberals rivalled the late minister of trade and commerce — C. D. Howe, Mr. Myers said.

Deputy President Of Ass'n Will Start Canada Tour Here

Dr. E. Kirk Lyon, Learnington, Ontario, deputy to H.R.H. The Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh, president of the Canadian Medical Association, will commence a two-month coast-to-coast tour of provincial medical associations in Charlottetown tomorrow.

Dr. Lyon, who was appointed deputy to His Royal Highness June 30, will address doctor delegates attending the 1959 provincial association convention tomorrow afternoon.

The deputy president's address will deal with the role of medically-sponsored plans to pre-pay the cost of illness. He will also present a message to all members from The Prince Philip, the association's president.

Dr. Lyon will be accompanied by Dr. A.D. Kelly, general secretary of the C.M.A., and two scientific speakers, Dr. E.A.K. Kisch, London, Ontario, and Dr. G. Leslie Wilcox, Edmonton, Alberta.

All sessions of the two-day provincial medical association convention which begins tomorrow

morning will be chaired by the president, Dr. J.H. Maloney of Charlottetown.

The annual Medical Ball to be held at the Charlottetown Hotel this evening, and a reception at Shaw's Hotel Saturday evening will highlight the occasion.

Seven Appear In City Court

Fines of \$75 and costs or 30 days in the Queen's County jail were meted out to two Charlottetown residents on impaired driving charges. Both were originally charged with drunken driving but pleaded not guilty to this charge and guilty to that of impaired driving.

A resident of Hunter River was convicted of speeding and was fined \$20 and costs or ten days.

Of three persons charged with being drunk and incapable, a 11 from the city, two were given fines of \$20 and costs or ten days and the third \$5 and costs or three days.

A fine of \$20 and costs or ten days was meted out to another Charlottetown man who was convicted of unlawfully having possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than his residence.

During the night the hunt was carried on by the City Police and the night street sweepers. This morning the police were reinforced by members of the Charlottetown Fire Department, relatives and a number of private citizens.

The first part of the forenoon was taken up with searching the east end of the city, about eleven o'clock the hunt was shifted to the Malpeque Road, Spring Park and the Royalties.

Court Is Held At Georgetown

MONTAGUE — A mixture of liquor and motor vehicle violations occupied the attention of Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet, Q.C., in Kings County Magistrate's court held at Georgetown Wednesday.

A resident of Ellersloe was fined \$25 for having liquor in his possession which had not been purchased from a vendor, and a resident of Belle River was fined \$20 for being intoxicated in a public place.

A Murray Harbor North resident was fined \$20 for having liquor in a place other than his residence.

A Montague resident charged with having the care and control of a motor vehicle while intoxicated had his case further adjourned for one week and was further remanded.

A resident of Georgetown, two residents of Montague and one of Greenwich were each fined \$5 and costs for failing to stop at a stop sign.

A resident of Lower Montague was fined \$10 for passing a vehicle on a grade when proceeding in the same direction and not having a clear view of the highway for a distance of 400 feet.

A resident of Kinross, one of Cherry Valley and one of Bonshaw were each fined \$10 for driving without due care and attention.

A resident of Seven Mile Road was fined \$5 and costs for having improper equipment on his motor vehicle, and a Montague resident was fined \$10 for failing to register a vehicle for the current year.

Policeman Transferred

Cpl. Gordon Humphrey of the local detachment of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police has been transferred to B' division, Saint John's Newfoundland.

A native of Digby, Nova Scotia, Cpl. Humphrey enlisted in the R.C.M.P. in 1948 and after taking his police training in Regina and Ottawa, he was posted to the Prince Edward Island division in 1949 where he remained until 1952.

theatres of war the most powerful forces the British people have ever raised and worthily you discharged that task.

"We have equal confidence that as the leader of a great sister democracy you will carry through your task with the same courage and the same success."

Eisenhower replied: "I must say my deepest reaction and sentiment at this moment is of the extraordinary pleasure and true enjoyment for being back once again in this land which I have learned so much to love.

"I do not need to come here to assure you or the British people that the American people stand with them strongly, firmly and determinedly in the defence of freedom, liberty and the dignity of man. You know that we feel that way."

After greeting old friends and inspecting an RAF guard of honor the two leaders drove in an open Rolls Royce to the American ambassador's residence.

Eisenhower will pay an informal, 24-hour visit today to the Queen in Scotland, where she is vacationing. He then will go to Chequers, the prime minister's residence in Buckinghamshire, for weekend talks.

Diplomatic sources said that in their review of international affairs, the two leaders will cover:

1. An analysis of Soviet foreign policy intentions and tactics.
2. The Berlin crisis, German reunification and European security problems. The president will be able to give Macmillan an account of his talks with Adenauer on this matter.
3. The prospects of an East-West summit meeting.
4. General disarmament and nuclear weapon test ban questions.
5. The situations in the Middle East and the Far East, particularly the renewed fighting in the Indochina kingdom of Laos.
6. Ways and means of aiding the economically underdeveloped territories.

A joint West German-American communique issued shortly before the president left Bonn affirmed the belief of the two countries in collective security pacts and said membership in NATO would continue to be the cornerstone of their policies.

sold only \$12,000,000 of the \$20,000,000 in 182-day treasury bills put up for tender, and announced that this week none of the longer-term bills would be tendered.

Thursday Mr. Fleming announced that next week \$100,000,000 in 91-day bills and \$15,000,000 in 182-day bills will be put up for tender. That will match the amount of 91-day bills then falling due.

Thursday's Bank of Canada interest rate, at 5.58 per cent, is .83 per cent below the peak of 6.41 reached two weeks ago. The decline has wiped out most of the rise of 1.15 per cent that occurred in the previous six weeks.

That rapid increase reflected a tremendous demand for loans which stretched the lending ability of the chartered banks.

DAMAGE EXTENSIVE

Early Wednesday evening a car travelling from the Keppoch district toward Charlottetown apparently went out of control at the junction of the Keppoch and Southport roads and ended up in the ditch on the north side of the latter.

Neither of the occupants, Donald MacPherson, Grandview, the driver, and Darrell Bartlett, Albany, the owner, suffered anything more than minor injuries which were treated on the spot after which they were permitted to proceed to Charlottetown.

IS AN EXTENSION

The plan under which the Liberal government proposes, if re-elected, to make textbooks free to Island students in grades one through eight, is an extension of an existing policy, it was explained Thursday by party supporters.

At present the government pays an annual subsidy of \$50,000 toward the cost of books used by grades one through 12. Making all books free in the first eight grades would increase this cost to some \$150,000 for the first year, while the cost in later years probably would be about half that figure, it is estimated.
