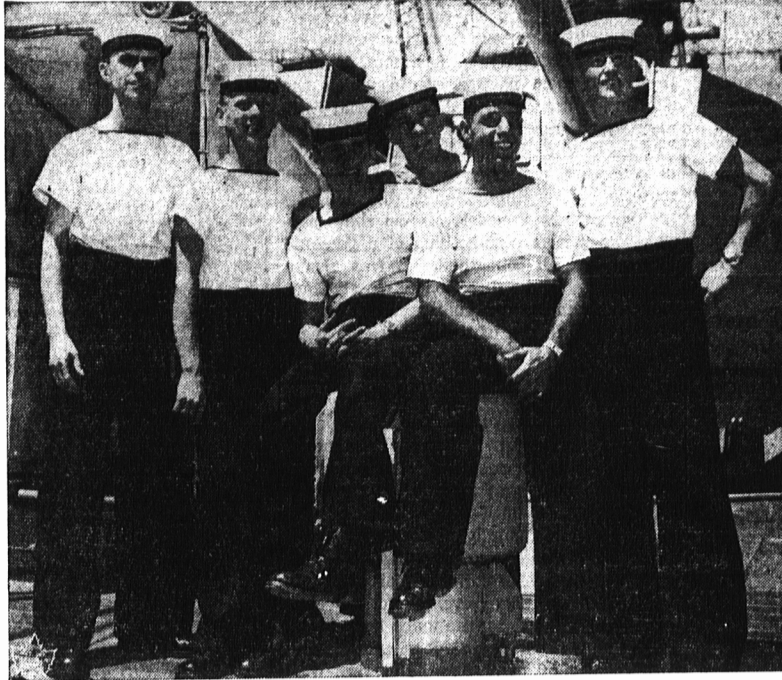

Activities Of Cooperative Union Of PEI Ltd. Reviewed

Following are excerpts from the report submitted by President Louis O'Connor at the annual meeting yesterday of the Co-operative Union of Prince Edward Island.

"Perhaps in no year since the inception of the Co-operative Union has so much involved business been presented to your Board. This has necessitated the holding of seven meetings of your Board three of which were meetings in conjunction with the P. E. I. Credit Union League in the past year due to quick decision required in some cases an executive committee consisting of the president of the Co-operative Union and one other director from each of these organizations and Mr. Dennis was appointed. This committee besides dealing with details connected with League and Co-op Union directors is also the committee of Co-op Insurance and the National Credit Society. This committee only met three times, but results accomplished lead us to believe that we should have had such a committee some years ago, and in the future we will be holding monthly meetings.

"Considerable study was made of Mr. L. P. MacIsaac's suggestions in regard to changes which might be made in the practice of using the co-operative movement on Prince Edward Island. These and other changes are still under consideration, and no doubt we have benefited to a considerable degree by the information he received from his course in England and his study of the history and organization of the different countries in Europe in regard to co-operative theory and practices.

"During the past year co-op courses have been distributed to managers and directors of the local co-ops for their instruction and information. These courses, should be of great benefit to managers and to the different Boards in regard to the operation of their organizations.

Drop Reported In PEI Egg Production

Egg production on Prince Edward Island has dropped approximately twenty-five per cent from peak which was reached this year in mid-May, reports Mr. F. M. Nash, district inspector of poultry products. Prevailing warm weather and more extensive range feeding is apparently having a detrimental effect on quality which is now reported as only fair. Top grades are in good demand and all available supplies are moving freely to other Maritime consuming centres and Newfoundland with undergrades going to Montreal. Prices have strengthened on top grades and producers are now receiving for ungraded eggs delivered AL 44, AM 42, B 22, C 15. Dealers are quoting for the graded pack delivered AL 52, AM 50, B 28, C 20, and quoting this pack to retailers at AL 55, AM 53, B 32, C 23. Retail to consumer AL 55-60, AM 53-8, B 39-42. Poultry market is weak and dealers are very cautious in purchases.

St. Thomas Aquinas Society Holds Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the Charlottetown branch of the St. Thomas Aquinas Society was held on Monday evening, July 7th, in the C. W. L. hall. A fairly representative group of members were in attendance.

In his opening remarks, the President, Dr. J. H. Blanchard, thanked the members for their continuing interest in the welfare of the Society. He gave a brief account of the work of this Society which is doing so much for the education of Acadian youth in this Province.

The minutes of the last meeting were read by the Secretary, Mr. F. E. Dolron, and adopted as read. The treasurer's report, given by Mrs. J. H. Blanchard, showed that the Charlottetown branch of the Society has had a very active and successful year, the total receipts for the year amounting to the very considerable sum of \$856.41. This amount was realized from membership fees, but especially from the proceeds of card parties, rummage sales, cake sales, lottery and a tag day the previous Saturday.

"We have thirty-four organizations or chain of co-operative associations, with five of a staff for advice, auditing, supervision, education, promotion, income tax problems, council on all phases of local operation, staff changes, expansion, laws, as well as serving as a sympathetic ear for the grievances of directors, management and members. This same staff audits fifty-four credit unions, listens to all their grievances as well as our own, runs a share and loan department, deals in share deposits and loans, answers questions from co-op and credit union sources outside the Province, submits reports to Dunn & Bradstreet's Statistical Dept. of Agriculture at Ottawa with all credit union and co-operative financial statements, approves all local co-op credits to banks and a hundred other things I can't think of, and yet we wonder how our money is being spent. From the little information I can get on the way private enterprise administrators their business I think we are expecting something far beyond what we have been willing to pay for.
