**BLACK'S HARBOR, N.B.** (CP)—The world's largest sardine canning factory is reopening European and Australian markets as the finger-jug herdsman makes a strong comeback after a 15-month absence from the rich Bay of Fundy feeding grounds near New Brunswick's southern shore.

Alan McLean, president of Comers Brothers Ltd., said Monday the decline started in 1960 and ended last June. This year he expects to reach 1,200,000 cases, about two-thirds of which will go to United Kingdom, Australian and other markets. The rest will be sold in Canada and the United States.

He said if the heavy sardine run continues, this will be the company's biggest year. Preceding this year's output, he said, "that means 120,000,000 cases."

He explained that although this year's output is expected to be normally only 50 per cent is sold overseas, with the remainder going to domestic consumers.

**Oil Czar Dies**  
**In Plane Crash**

**MILAN, Italy (AP)**—Enrico Mattei, the aggressive Italian oil czar who shattered international oil profit-sharing traditions, and two other persons were killed Saturday night in the crash of a private jet plane.

The other victims were William McAllister, chief of time magazine's Rome bureau, and Mattei's pilot, Ernesto Berlusconi, a former pilot for Italy's national airline.

Police said the twin-engine jet crashed in a dense fog near this northern industrial town on a flight from Catania, Sicily, to Milan. The plane lost contact with airport and crashed in a marshy area near the village of Sesto, 10 miles from Milan, and burned.

Mattei, 56, won world attention as the aggressive oil entrepreneur who shattered the government-owned ENI-Ente Nazionale Idrocarburi (national hydrocarbon authority).

He broke the tradition of 50-50 profit-sharing between big Western companies and oil-producing countries by granting Iran 75 per cent of ENI's national oil profits.

Under his leadership, ENI went into a rich industrial empire including oil fields, refineries, pipelines, tanker fleets, filling stations, and a string of petroleum-derivative factories.

**Insurance Official Critical**  
**Of Power Co. Takeover Offer**

**MONTREAL (CP)**—F. J. McDiarmid, vice-president of the Lincoln National Life Insurance Company of Fort Wayne, Ind., said Monday the \$600,000,000 price mentioned for public takeover of 11 Quebec power companies is "considerably more" than the price "rammed down the throats" of British Columbia Electric Company.

He said \$600,000,000 could be termed a "bare minimum" for purchase of the Quebec companies.

Mr. McDiarmid told the Canadian Club that his insurance company held \$1,400,000 in bonds of the Shawinigan Water and Power Company.

Mr. McLean said markets were good especially in Austria and Britain. He said the company sets the same price in both countries.

The Australian market had been built up over a five-year period when heavy sardine catches were being made, he said.

He blamed foreign exchange problems as well as a low sardine catch for a dip in Australian sales in 1960-61.

It was a "purely Australian exchange rate about the same time the sardine catch began to increase," he said, "which contributed to the rising market."

Mr. McLean said competition from French and Italian producers was stiff in Europe but Canadian exports "are being pushed."

Imported sardines do not offer much competition in Canada, he said. "Our sardines are usually more ordinary people while the imported product attracts people who can afford to pay for a fancy label or tin."

He added that imported sardines cost three times as much as Canadian sardines.

Sardine offers a heads and tails—converted into chicken feed for export to the U.S.

VANCOUVER (CP)—Veteran Canadian newspaper man Herbert C. Manning died Saturday from heart attack in hospital here. He was 49.

Born in Winnipeg, Mr. Manning joined the news department of the Winnipeg Tribune in the mid-30s after attending the University of Manitoba and later became sports editor of The Tribune and his daily column "The Man's Opinion" was widely read.

His father's victims were horse racing and football.
