THE examination of Valleyfield West School, held on June 30th, under the tuition of D. B. Martin, was quite a success. A number of parents were present, and the way the pupils conducted themselves showed that the teacher has diligently performed his duty during the last six months.

SYMES' TROUBLE.—The attempt of Mr. Symes to swear out of jail in Halifax must, we think, be considered as an acknowledgment of the fact that neither he nor his firm had the means at command to warrant the operations undertaken by him in the dead meat trade with Britain. It is to be regretted that such proof is to be the case. Nevertheless, there still seems reason to believe that the over-venturous man has given a valuable impulse to a trade that will some day prove profitable to the country.—St. John News.

THE sham fight on Halifax common, on the 5th inst., was the largest affair of the kind ever seen there. The main body of defenders were entrenched behind a redoubt on Camp Hill. The attack commenced by a heavy artillery fire about 11 o'clock, and was sustained with great vigor on both sides, but the attacking party was largely superior in numbers and advanced on the redoubt at all points and captured it after a desperate resistance. After the close of the conflict there was a march past before the Governor General and staff.

CERTAIN features of the new Tay bridge that shall supplant the one which went down with such frightful loss of life, appear to have been exactly fixed upon. Its total length will be 10,000 feet, or about two miles, and calculations are made for double the wind pressure which the strongest gale will ever bring to bear upon the bolts. The wind pressure is placed at 21 pounds per square foot, and allowance is made for 56 pounds. Each pier will be independent of the old one, and will be placed in an opposite position. It is intended that there shall be a parapet of wrought iron, as a precaution in case a car should leave the rails. This is shutting the stable door after the horse has strayed out.

MR. A. L. GRAVES is, we are pleased to learn, already the manager of a neat, well-printed little semi-weekly paper in Emerson, Manitoba, called The Gateway Express. We have received the first number, from which we clip the following news item:—

"This year's immigration to Manitoba and the North West from Ontario and the Lower Provinces far exceeds that of any previous year, but a correct estimate of the number of people who have arrived cannot be had. It is assumed, however, by those who profess to be posted on immigration affairs, that no less than from ten to twelve thousand people have come to Manitoba since the opening of spring. Wages are good for unskilled laborers, as high as \$2.25 being paid for railroad hands. Farm laborers command as high as \$25 per month and being. Carpenters, brick-layers and tradesmen of all kinds get from \$2.50 to \$3 per day. The demand for servant girls is large and in some cases in Winnipeg as much as \$20 per month has been paid for good girls. Under these circumstances people coming to this country, if they are willing to work, need have no fear of getting something to do."

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CANADIAN. MONTREAL, July 5.

The reception of Miss Fanny Parnell was held last night in Albert Hall. She was given a great ovation on appearing on the platform. Mr. Thompson of the Toronto Land League was present.

In her reply to the welcome, Miss Parnell said the Land League labored under great disadvantage, because of being in British dominions. In the States there were no such difficulties. The English Government was not the worst enemy of Ireland; Irish landlords were. She said the Land League was uniting Catholics and Orangemen, and that the latter would yet make good nationalists.

The Assistant Inspector of Weights and Measures here has been arrested on a charge of perjury. He gave bail and will answer the charge on the 13th inst.

The strike is quiet. The wharves were cleared by police once or twice but there was no disturbance. Madame Gagnier left her home in La Prairie on Thursday and has not since been heard from.

UNITED STATES. MONTICELLO, ARK., July 5.

Howard Edmonds has been arrested for the murder of Miss Sallie Watson, daughter of Hon. J. R. Watson. Edmonds is a cousin and brother-in-law of the murdered lady. He is in jail. The excitement is intense and increasing as fresh evidence is found against him. Fears are entertained that he will be lynched. The body of Miss Watson was found in the woods on Saturday, after she had been missing four days.

LACONIA, N. H., July 6. A two-story tenement house at Duck village was burned last night. Three children of Charles (Jody colored), aged respectively 4, 6 and 10 years, perished.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND. LONDON, July 5.

The application for new trial in the Bend Or libel case has been granted. The Financialer says the murderous outrage in Washington has only a very moderate effect on the prices of American securities. After the first tendency to panic had passed away, which it did very quickly, remarkable steadiness became apparent.

The Sportsman says: The match race for the cup recently offered by the manager in England of an American firm, to be called the "International Collie Cup," is being arranged between the Cornell University crew and the Dublin University crew. The match will probably be rowed at Putney. The Cornell crew have entered in the race for the Thames Cup at the Metropolitan Amateur Regatta on the 14th inst. They will meet the London and Thames Rowing Clubs.

WEXFORD, Ireland, July 5. At 9 o'clock this morning the steamer Britannia was all tight, excepting in her fourth compartment. The position of the ship is unchanged. Weather fine. A quantity of the cargo was jettisoned, and fishing boats loaded about 700 packages.
