Drama Festival Executive Meeting
A meeting of the Drama Festival executive was held on April 9, at the Charlottetown Hotel with the president, Mrs. Fred Gates, presiding.

There was a good attendance and reports of the various committees were given.

Miss Estelle Bowness, convener of Junior Drama, stated that all plays will be adjudicated before the end of April, and that all those who have not sent in their entries must do so immediately.

Miss Fraser reported that entries for the Senior Drama Festival were received from the following centres: Charlottetown, Tignish, Central Bedeque, Indian River, St. Peter's Bay, Emerald, Kelvin Grove and North Tryon. Tentative dates were set for the presentation of these plays and it was decided necessary to reserve four nights during the latter part of May for the finals which would be presented in Charlottetown.

After much discussion re the purchasing of pennants which will be presented this year to all schools participating in these plays and it was moved and seconded that Mrs. Frank Ross be authorized to purchase one hundred small pennants and a sufficient number of large pennants.

It was also moved and seconded that the Scholarship Trust Fund be transferred to the P. E. I. Drama Festival Fund, and that the treasurer and president would be the signing officers for this fund.

The following were appointed on the nominating committee: Mrs. Allison MacMillan, Fairview; Miss Estelle Bowness, Summerside; Mrs. Leslie Ramsey, Indian River; Mrs. W. A. Bruce, Valleyfield; Mr. Arthur Vessey, York; Mr. Millar MacFadyen, Charlottetown.

THE TEACHER'S IMPORTANCE
During the past week the teachers have been holding their annual meetings. They constitute a group of citizens devoted, even dedicated, to one of the noblest of professions, that of education. And they are dedicated to developing to the full the human personalities in whose hands the future of Canada will one day rest.

The fact that so many teachers are willing to meet together to discuss common problems and to rekindle their enthusiasm for their vocation, is a great tribute to the teacher. Such a gathering must be a real source of encouragement both to the parents and to the civil and religious leaders who watch over the material and spiritual welfare of the citizens.

It is only when we realize what a human being is, that we can fully appreciate the importance of the teacher. A human being has been created by God to know Him and love Him. Because of that lofty, eternal purpose, God has given man the wonderful faculties of intellect and will, the powers by which man seeks for and finds truth, and adheres to it when he has found it. The task of education is to guide those wonderful human powers of knowledge and love to the fulfillment to develop in the child the

One of the most difficult problems of this generation is worry. Some people seem to set aside special times to worry as they do for meditation. In such cases it becomes a habit, and like all habits is hard to overcome. It is easy enough to start each day with a resolution not to worry over things trivial and unimportant, not to cross one's bridges till we come to them. To live for a day without worry and bear shut-out gives us the assurance that we can do the same the next day and the next indefinitely. Try it, won't you?

But such a vocation imposes the gravest of obligations. The realization that the formation of a hu-

man personality, made to the image and likeness of God, is his task, demands of the teacher a profound reverence for truth on the one hand, and for the soul that he has undertaken to guide to truth on the other. In a very real sense, to educate is to give a child God's view of the world; to give him, that is, a view of all the world - its science, its mathematics, its art, its history - as it really is.

This is to do more than give facts; it is to develop the habits of mind which will discern and reverence truth and beauty wherever they are found. And finally, in such an intimate union as that between the minds of teacher and pupil, it is inevitable that the goodness or evil of the soul of the teacher will affect, in some degree at least, the souls of those taught.

Now that a great percentage of our children spend so much of their lives, in the hands of teachers, we must do all we can to guarantee that we shall have teachers who realize fully the sacred character of their vocation; teachers who live ever mindful of the prophet Daniel: "They that instruct many unto justice shall shine as the stars for all eternity"; and of the words of Our Divine Lord: "He that shall do and teach, he shall be called great in the Kingdom of Heaven."
