Not So Poor After All.

Writers and Speakers in the Opposition interest frequently refer to the Dominion as one of the poorest countries in the world. A correspondent of the Montreal "Journal of Commerce" supplies the following fitting answer to such an assertion:

"He who represents ours as a comparatively poor country must have a superlatively poor knowledge of our people, and of the vastness of their wealth, enterprise and domain. What other community, or state, or country of only four millions of people, in the old world or the new, can boast of owning such a steamboat line and two such telegraph companies as Canadians possess; such a bank as that of Montreal, with its capital of twelve millions, all paid up; and no less than thirty-six others in the same field with a capital of \$48,352,305, and possessing united assets of nearly two hundred million of dollars; and in addition to these owning such immense and valuable public works in canals, railways, bridges and docks, together with a country of such size, fertility and magnificence, governed by its own people, with all the rich products of the mine, fisheries, woods, agriculture and commerce.

The exports of manufactured goods continue to increase.

The New Jersey fishermen are having a good deal of trouble with sharks this season. At Seabright last week, one boat was stove through the bottom by a shark which followed a bluefish that had been hooked, and the occupants narrowly escaped drowning. In another case a blue shark jumped clear into a fisherman's boat, while endeavoring to seize a fish that had been hooked. Fortunately, however, it jumped over the stern and slid lengthwise into the boat, or it would have capsized it. The fishermen quickly dispatched the monster with the hatchets they always carry for such emergencies. It measured six feet in length.

WAR AMONG THE SEALS.—A letter from Hesquiaht, on the West Coast of Victoria Island, states that at that station alone 400 fur seals have been bought. The few Indians settled there have made more than \$5,000 in two months. Some made as high as \$120 in one day apiece; many from \$30 to \$80 each. The yield is as good as that of a rich gold "find," if it would but last. In all it is estimated that the West Coast Indians must have received \$30,000 in hard cash in two months' time. Since the latter end of May the weather on the coast has been stormy.

Latest News Notes.

Mr. Ruskin has consented to run against Mr. Bright as Conservative candidate for the Lord Rectorship of Glasgow University.

A writer in *Temple Bar* says that "the most unobtrusively well-behaved, man toward women is, paradox as some may think it, a really well-bred American."

The official return gives the value of diamonds exported from the South African diamond fields in 1879 as £3,685,610, the value of those obtained in 1878 being £3,084,711.

Mr. C. G. Dyett, a teller in the Bank of Montreal at Goderich, Ont., shot himself through the heart on Wednesday last. Religious monomania is said to be the cause of the suicide.

The *London Truth* says "that when an American lady takes a Parisian husband she feels as if married only to a semi-human being who has mean ideas about living on his wife's money."

Lager Beer is declared to be intoxicating by the police magistrate in Halifax. The samples tested in that city contained from four to seven per cent. alcohol. He imposes a fine for selling it without a license.

A sample of bituminous coal from the North-West Territory has been shown on 'Change in Montreal. The sample was sent to Messrs. Gault Bros. & Co., and was taken from the River Souris, 200 miles south-west of Winnipeg.

James Doyle, of Brooklyn, poisoned his mother's fifteen cows. They were her sole support. The trial judge said it was one of the most atrocious crimes which had come before him in a good many years, and he sent the prisoner for three years to the penitentiary.

The figures show that there were 800,000 tons of ice secured on the Kennebec last winter, which at \$2.50 per ton will produce \$2,000,000. This is more ice by 100,000 than was ever secured on the river before, and the total crop of the State of Maine is estimated at 1,500,000 tons.

Horace Russell, a Republican, has been appointed Judge of the New York Superior Court in place of the late Chief Justice Curtis. He is thirty-seven years of age. He does not become Chief Justice, as he only holds temporarily until the next general election. The Judges elect their own Chief.

Indignation among the passengers in a railroad car is reported from Ohio because a lady let her pig dog drink out of the tin cup attached to the water-cooler. She replied to a remonstrance by asserting that her dog's lips were cleaner than those of the tobacco-chewing man who objected. He replied that he could whip any man who would become her champion, but nobody volunteered.

INTERESTING RELIC.—An Ottawa despatch reports that at a recent communication, Bro. Henry Sikes presented the Prince of Wales Lodge, of that city, with a masonic relic in the shape of a gavel, which is claimed to be somewhere in the neighborhood of 220 years old. It is most peculiar in appearance, the head being of ivory, fastened to an iron handle by means of a silver band bearing the following inscription:—"The gift of Bro. Felix Pritchett, to the Tipperary Lodge, No 296." The gavel came into the possession of Bro. Sikes' grandfather, close on 75 years ago, and at that time was held as a relic.

There are 64 cities in the United States with a population exceeding 30,000; there are 44 cities with more than 40,000; 34 with more than 50,000; 27 with more than 60,000; 24 with more than 70,000; 20 with more than 100,000; 4 with more than 500,000, and 1 with more than 1,000,000. London is a long way ahead of New York, but the other English cities fall below the American cities. Liverpool ranks below Philadelphia and Brooklyn; Manchester and Birmingham are below Chicago and St. Louis; Leeds and Sheffield are below Boston and Baltimore.

The value of the imports into England in the first six months of this year was £210,760,753 against £172,631,723 in the corresponding period of last year, being an increase of twenty per cent. For the year ending with June, the increase in imports was over 34 per cent. Exports for the six months showed as great an increase as the imports, having risen from £88,826,493 to £107,633,735, an increase of over 20 per cent. The addition in the imports consisted mainly of raw materials. The colonial trade showed an expansion; and as the United States demands fall off, other outlets are found.

A Kabul despatch says that a general feeling of relief is manifested among the Afghans that a conclusive step has at last been taken and the new Ameer will commence his reign with many conditions in his favor. He will scarcely allow sentimental gratitude to Russia for past favors to outweigh those future favors which he knows he might expect from British if he behaves loyally, nor, if all native testimony is to be believed, will Afghans themselves permit their future ruler to risk involving them in a second contest with the British by exhibiting Russian symptoms.
