

Eagles Edge Greenwood; Take Tri-Service Trophy

SUMMERSIDE — RCAF Summerside Eagles defeated Greenwood Bombers 4-2 in a rough, brawling game on home ice Saturday to win the Tri-Service Trophy, emblematic of the Maritime Armed Forces Hockey League championship.

Third period goals by George Buffet and Ray Prang and excellent substitute goal-tending by defenceman Bob Bird sparked the Eagles to the victory.

Buffet broke up a 2-2 tie early in the final period. The other goal from the Greenwood blue line and Prang added an insurance marker with less than three minutes remaining. Bird volunteered to replace Gord MacLean who received a game misconduct in the first period. The other Eagle goal, Gerry Campbell could not play.

Husky Guy Delorme netted a power play goal in the first period to give Greenwood a 1-0 lead before Jean Paul Guy tied it up with Summerside, short handed.

The first period was especially rough with 14 penalties called. Delorme was shaken up by a

rugged check thrown by Eagles' George MacDonald. Linemen Jack Conner from Greenwood was dumped over the boards twice and received a hand injury when he got in the way of punishing checks. The period was called at 17:01 after Eagles' MacDonald and Greenwood's Ab MacDonald were sent off for fighting.

Greenwood surged ahead 2-1 in a tamed down second period on Dave Wood's deflection but Guy converted Larry Boone's behind the net pass to tie it again 5:25 later.

The Eagles relied on persistent forechecking following Buffet's goal in the third period to contain the big, dangerous Bombers. Summerside checked so effectively that Greenwood could only manage four shots on Bird.

"We won because we went out there as a unit," said Eagles' Red Gravelle. Gravelle, usually a free wheeling skater, shrugging off jarring checks, continually handed out some of his own belts. "I was saving it for this game," the Eagle captain said.

"It was our best checking game of the year. Greenwood were not pushovers," commented playing coach Tony Licari.

Greenwood forward Bob Castle, a fine playmaker, said the Bombers "had no drive" and thought Summerside's second tying goal was the turning point.

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Red Wings Defeat Bruins; Canadiens Nip Rangers

BOSTON (AP)—Paul Henderson and Doug Barkley, who have only 10 goals between them this season, rallied Detroit's National Hockey League leaders in a 5-2 victory over Boston Bruins Sunday night.

Veteran defenceman Al Langlois assisted both players on first-period scores.

Henderson's second goal of the night and sixth of the campaign capped a three-goal Red Wing outburst in the third period when the visitors broke a wide open.

Ron Murphy and Alex Devecchio counted earlier in the finale.

The triumph was the eighth in nine games for the streaking Red Wings who started with two forwards on the sidelines, and who lost Gordie Howe after 25 minutes with an injured right leg.

Henderson smashed a close-in shot through rookie goalie Jack Norris' pads at 17:09 of the first period, putting Detroit ahead to stay.

Defenceman Barkley tied the score with his fourth goal of the season when his 40-foot slap shot deflected into the goal off Bruin Reggie Fleming's leg.

Boston's Al McDonald, scoring for the third time in as many games, collected the opening goal of the game and Ed Westfall got the last one. But in between, Roger Crozier, the Red Wings' rookie goalie stopped the comparatively few shots the Bruins could muster.

Bob Nevin's power play goal at 16:08 made it close again, but Montreal sewed it up with 46 seconds left on Tremblay's 125-foot roller into an open net. The Rangers had pulled Paille in a last-minute bid to tie.

The second of two goals by Jean Ratelle had pulled New York even at 3:3 earlier in the period after Ralph Backstrom's 21st tally of the season gave the Canadiens their first lead.

The Rangers broke to a 2-0

lead early in the second period on goals by Ratelle and John Brenneman, but Montreal countered with a pair of scores before the period ended.

Bobby Rousseau's power play goal halved the New York margin at 11:07 and Dick Duff, an ex-Ranger, tied it at 16:14 on a pass from Rousseau.

The Canadiens outshot New York 20-9.

NEW YORK (AP)—Late goals by Jean Beliveau, Gordon Berenson and J. C. Tremblay gave Montreal's National Hockey League contenders a 6-4 victory over New York Rangers Sunday night.

The Canadiens, in a three-way battle for the NHL title, played without Henri Richard and Dave Balon, injured in Saturday night's game against Detroit, and Jean-Guy Talbot, nursing a bruised foot.

But Berenson, brought up from Quebec of the American League for the game, scored what proved to be the decisive goal and assisted on two others.

Beliveau broke a 3-3 tie, with 7 1/2 minutes to go in the third period, converting Claude Provost's rebound. Berenson made it 5-3 with a little more than five minutes to play on a wicked backhand that escaped New York goalie Marcel Paille.

CHICAGO (AP)—Chicago Black Hawks hung onto second place in the tight National Hockey League race by rallying to defeat fourth-place Toronto Maple Leafs 5-3 here Sunday night.
