Souris—14° below zero. THERE is but a very slight difference in the amount of Customs receipts at Montreal for 1885 and those for 1884. The figures are: Twelve months last year, \$6,682,702; twelve months previous year, \$6,787,722. The collections of Inland Revenue at that city last year, \$1,609,950 as compared with \$1,359,083 in 1884. In the manufacture of the "Myrtle Navy" brand the sugar used is the finest white loaf, known in the trade as granulated. This is a sugar in which there is seldom any adulteration, but to guard against the possibility of it, all sugar used in the factory is submitted to a careful test of its purity. The gum used is the pure gum arabic. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) Terrible and Narrow Escape. GRAVENHURST, Jan. 12. Early this morning, Tait's boarding house at Germania took fire while the inmates were asleep. They were awakened and three dashed down the stairway before it fell, but the others' escape was cut off. They succeeded, however, in forcing themselves through a small window and dropped to the ground. All were badly burned; they had nothing on but their night shirts and had to run to a house some distance off with the thermometer at 20 degrees below zero. A Revolt. PARIS, Jan. 12. A despatch from Riom states that six hundred convicts in prison have revolted and secured possession of the prison. Troops have been ordered to Riom to quell the disturbance. Officials are parleying with the rebels, in order to gain time for the military to arrive. A Fight. LONDON, Jan. 12. A fight has taken place between a body of Russian troops and 600 Shoshovals, who were crossing the Russian frontier to winter in Russian Moyghan. Eighty Shoshovals and 17 Cossacks were killed in the battle, and a large number wounded. Serbia's Resolution. BELGRADE, Jan. 12. Serbia has resolved not to make peace with Bulgaria until the question regarding the disposition of Eastern Roumelia by the powers has been solved in a manner which will satisfy the wishes of the Servian Government. A Thaw in the Balkans. LONDON, Jan. 12. A thaw, accompanied by heavy rains, has set in in the Balkans, and has caused much destruction. The despatches say many human beings have perished, but no definite statement of the loss of life has been received. Cold Weather. TORONTO, Jan. 12. Last night was considered the coldest of the present cold snap. At Montreal the thermometer registered 26 below zero. The most northerly telegraph office in Ontario registered 42 below zero; Toronto, 14 below. The Eastern Question. LONDON, Jan. 12. H. MORE SMALLPOX IN CAPE BRETON.—A despatch of the 8th to the Halifax Chronicle says: "The particulars of the reported small-pox cases at Marion Bridge, C. B., could not be ascertained last night, but from a reliable source to-day I learn that there are at present four cases in that locality. A man named Morgan died there with the small-pox on Dec. 23rd. His wife and her sister and two children have taken it since and are reported all doing well except Mrs. Morgan, whose case two days ago was considered hopeless. Dr. Kendall, of Sydney, who has attended all the small-pox cases during its prevalence, is attending daily the cases at Marion Bridge, and every possible precaution is taken to prevent the spread of the disease. DEASTER TO THE SCHOONER B. LEACH.—The schooner Jess, Captain McGuire, which arrived at Boston on Friday last, from Souris, P. E. I., reports on January 4th, when 92 miles west of Cape Sable, she passed the wreck of the schooner R. Leach. She was on her beam ends and bowsprit gone, and masts hanging by the board, and was directly in the track of vessels, and most dangerous to navigation. Special Notices. 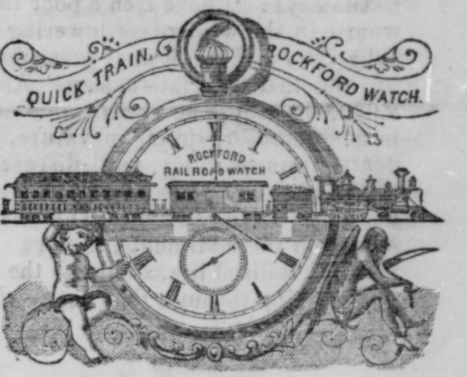
