THE NEWS IN SHORT METRE.

Items of Interest Brought Down For More Easy Reading. Rev. Michael G. O'Connell, a Baptist minister of Hillsboro, Albert County, N. B., died on Sunday morning, aged 70.

Saturday Night is taking steps to secure from Mgr. Farrelly, of Belleville, a retraction of the expression, "that infidel paper, Toronto Saturday Night."

The town of Campbellton is expropriating the water works that supply the town and is preparing to acquire an electric light plant. Parr-boro has voted money for electric light and will control its own water system.

The Montreal Herald says of the Toronto election, "congratulations are due to Mr. Tarte." So they are. It is a victory for Mr. Tarte, Mr. Blair, Mr. Greenshields and the million dollar deal.

No one knows each night just where the Sultan of Turkey spends the hours of darkness. He has a series of bedrooms—as many as fifty, it is said, in some of his palaces—and to these he retires alone, sleeping in whatever apartment may take his fancy. The doors are made of solid iron and are fitted with highly elaborate locks.

The Halifax Herald of Monday remarks that, "Rev. J. W. Falconer, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, Truro, preached in Coburg road church yesterday morning and in St. Mathews in the evening. On both occasions the rev. gentleman was listened to with deep and interested attention. Rev. Mr. Falconer is one of the foremost Presbyterian preachers in Nova Scotia, a fact that was demonstrated to Halifax people by his thoughtful, eloquent and earnest sermons yesterday."

Presbyterian polity is to be discussed before the courts at Ottawa. The heirs of the late Rev David J. Hyland are suing for arrears of salary while he was wrongfully suspended, and for a time after he was reinstated. Charges were made against the deceased minister upon which he was suspended by the Presbytery of Ottawa. He was acquitted and reinstated, but when he went back to his church to preach no one attended, and he had the church to himself. After a short period of such experiences, he resigned. Those who signed the bond guaranteeing his salary are now being sued.

The Bishop of Bristol at his enthronement said: "I take my bishop's seat among you as the heir, and to you the representative, of St. Chad of Mercia and of Birinus of Wessex, who sat in their bishop's seats 1,250 years ago. I can count my episcopal ancestry name by name on either side. I take my bishop's seat among you as the only person competent to exercise episcopal jurisdiction, to perform episcopal functions, in this city of Bristol and in the deaneries of North Wilts, in accordance with the principles of the Catholic Church and the immemorial Constitution of this realm. It is in that character, in that authority that I shall always know, and you will always know, that my episcopal acts are done."

The Marchand government, of Quebec, after the usual grit manner, are going into the money borrowing business, this time for \$2,000,000, and again in the usual grit manner also, are trying to put the blame on the loan of their predecessors. They allege that the previous government left a deficit of over \$900,000, and made promise of about \$1,000,000 in railway subsidies "without legislative warrant." There is no evidence so far of any deficit except of grit manufacture, and the Marchand government can be under no obligation as to subsidies promised by their predecessors "without legislative warrant." From the evidence so far, it appears that the new loan of \$2,000,000 is to pay a deficit made, and subsidies promised, by Mr. Marchand and his friends.

Sir Arthur Farwood, bart, conservative member of parliament for the southwest division of Lancashire, in a speech at Liverpool on Thursday, in discussing Great Britain's friction and the attitude of other powers, spoke of the foreign policy of the United States as being difficult to forecast. Speaking broadly he explained, the United States would be slow to draw the sword in any quarrel excepting with herself; but at the same time, he added, "her domestic and political divisions are so keen, her politicians are so unscrupulous as to the methods they use to injure their opponents, and their press so sensational and effective, that any day the United States might unwittingly and without real intent, be found in conflict with some other power." At the bottom of Yankee hearts there is regard for England, but their minds are so overloaded with old prejudices that we could not with reasonable certainty calculate on which side of an issue the great republic might stand.

Enlargement of Carter & Co's. Store—Something About Their Goods.

The well known and centrally-located establishment of Geo. Carter & Co., has been materially enlarged by the building of an extension at the rear. The extension is of brick, and is three stories in height. It is the width of their main store and the same height, and is thirty-six feet long. The addition is neatly sheathed and artistically painted, and, like the main store, is lighted by electricity and heated by hot air.

The ground floor portion of the addition is to be used as a seed store in the spring; but for the holiday season it will be filled with a choice stock of chinaware, and fancy goods. The second floor will be used as a stock room for the wholesale department, and the third will be set apart as a store-room for surplus stocks of wall paper.

The store may now be entered from Grafton street as well as from Queen street. It will be a great convenience in the busy season to have two places of entrance and exit.

The establishment of Geo. Carter & Co., has for several years been known as the headquarters of Santa Claus, the friend of the little ones, and this year he will again take up quarters there knowing, as he does, that it is the largest establishment in the province in the lines of fancy goods, toys and books suitable for Christmas gifts. Carter's stock of holiday goods was never better than it is this year, and no one need be without something in keeping with the season. Judging by the trade they have already obtained the Messrs. Carter may expect a big run during the holidays, and a snug slice of patronage the rest of the year as well.
