SERIOUS STRIKE SITUATION IN BELGIUM

ITALO-GERMAN ALLIANCE APPEARS LIKELY

Troops Called To Curb Disorders In Labor Crisis

170,000 Men Idle In Strike. Precautions Taken In Spain And Venezuela Strikes.

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)
Unyielding strikers in Belgium, Spain and Venezuela gave police and troops new and urgent business Tuesday. Mounted police, waving drawn sabres, charged rowdy crowds in Liege, Belgium's fortified city, while strikers crippled trolley service by threatening to burn the cars unless they were kept in their sheds. With 170,000 men idle, Belgium's strike situation appeared serious.

Three thousand miners trooped into their workings in Huelva Province, Spain, to add to that nation's varied and widespread labor trouble. They said they would stay there until their demands for more money and steady work were met. Civil guards and shock police were on the watch for disorders.

Venezuelan soldiers, spanking extremists with the flats of their machetes, broke up strike gatherings in the Great Lake Maracaibo oil region. Food supplies were getting low.

A noisy dispute over the social program of Premier Leon Blum, designed largely to satisfy the demands of hundreds of thousands of French strikers who now are going slowly back to work, caused temporary suspension of the French strike. There were scattered new strikes in France.

Break Up Gatherings
MARACAIBO, Venezuela, June 16—(A. P.)—Soldiers, using long-bladed machetes as clubs, broke up a succession of strikers' gatherings today.

No serious injuries were reported. It was said the troops were using the flats of the heavy knives with care but were strictly prohibiting any large assemblages of people.

With the workers in the Great Lake Maracaibo oil region out on strike and with longshoremen and other laborers joining them, the situation was regarded as acute.

Food supplies dwindled for, although there were seven ships in the harbor, no one would unload the cargoes they carried.

The strikers are demanding the complete abandonment by the government of a law of "peace and order" which contains features bordering on martial law.

Precautions In Palestine Redoubled

JERUSALEM, June 16—(C. P. Special Wire)—Precautions were redoubled tonight on the eve of Arab and Jewish services commemorating the martyrdom of Moslems executed in the bloody 1929 rioting. Continued sporadic disorders were reported meanwhile from outlying sectors of Palestine.

MAKES BOAST TO HENCHMEN OF DISMISSALS

Bradalbane Liberal Meeting Assured of Government's Zeal In Making Political Dismissals.

A challenge to Liberal party stalwarts to say that "there was ever a Government in this Province which replaced officials to a greater extent than we did," is reported to have been made by Premier Campbell at the annual meeting of the Liberal Association of the First District of Queens held Monday evening at Bradalbane.

The Premier's boast with regard to partisan dismissals was made in reply to criticism that not enough jobs were being distributed among the "faithful."

He also stated he had in view the introduction of legislation establishing a provincial Civil Service, which would have the effect of making Liberal appointments permanent.

The meeting was marked by lack of enthusiasm. Several polls were but silyly represented.

Mr. Fred MacDonald, Hampton, President of the Association, presided. The following officers were all re-elected: President, Fred MacDonald; Secretary, J. Verne Moore, Westmoreland; Vice President, J. Leo McGulgan, Hope River; Representatives on the Central Executive, J. Leo McGulgan and J. Verne Moore.

The speakers included Premier Campbell, Messrs. Russel C. Chandler and George J. Tweedy, Charlottetown, representing the County Association; W. F. A. Stewart and D. N. MacKay, the representatives of the district in the Legislature, and Malcolm MacKinnon, Churchill.

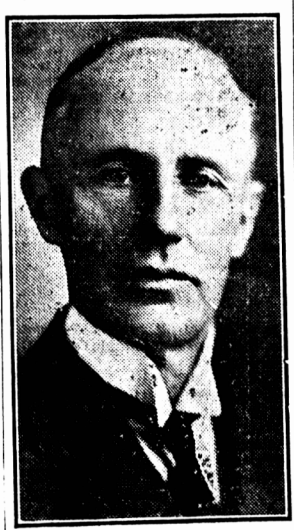

MEETS DEATH ACCIDENTALLY JURY FINDS

Mr. Willis MacGregor Instantly Killed In Ch'town Warehouse Yesterday.

The instant death of Mr. Willis MacGregor, 63-year-old employee at DeBlois Bros. warehouse yesterday morning had been accidental, a coroner's jury decided last night. The deceased's head had been caught between a moving elevator and the elevator shaft guard gate. There were no eye-witnesses to the accident but it was believed that Mr. MacGregor, who had been working on the third floor, had started the mechanical lift from the floor above and thinking it was below was leaning over the guard gate to see if all was clear when the descending machine caught his head, breaking his neck. An automatic stop had halted the elevator's descent.

The inquest was conducted by coroner Dr. I. J. Yeo. The verdict was "the text of the jury's finding: "We, the jury empanelled to inquire into the cause of the death of Willis MacGregor, do find that on the 16th day of June, 1936, at the DeBlois Building, Charlottetown, the deceased came to his death by being caught between the guard gate and the elevator causing his neck to be broken; that death was accidental and we believe that the elevator was started by his own hand." STRONG NOTE OF FRIENDSHIP IS SOUNDED

Diplomatic Observers See Effort To Force France's Hand At League Meeting.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) ROME, June 16—Italy, from sources close to Premier Mussolini, sounded a strong note of friendship for Germany today.

While the Reich's Ambassador, Ulrich Von Hassell, was arriving to acquaint Il Duce with details of his recent conversation with Chancellor Hitler, Virginio Gayda asserted Germany, throughout the Ethiopian war, "manifested sincerity and political friendship for Italy."

Gayda, editor of Il Giornale d'Italia, is Fascism's most authoritative newspaper commentator.

Usually well informed sources predicted an Italo-German economic conference in Rome would be held shortly. Danubian accords may be considered, they said.

Some diplomatic observers saw in the leaning toward Germany a move to force France to follow Britain's evident trend toward the lifting of sanctions.

Should there be a new central European alliance between Italy and Germany, observers pointed out, it would reach over territory from the North Sea to Sicily. There also have been reports of Italo-German negotiations on the settlement of Austria's status.

As for the League, Il Duce was preparing a memorandum for presentation to either the council or assembly, meeting late this month. Informed sources said the memorandum, while outlining Italy's position, probably would not make a specific request for the lifting of sanctions.

Believed Slayer Of Inventor

EAST ORANGE, N. J., June 16—Dr. Harrison S. Martland, Essex County medical examiner, announced tonight that "every indication" pointed to a man who killed himself in Monmouth County today as the mystery slayer of D. McFarland Moore, retired inventor and former associate of Thomas A. Edison.

He was identified as Jean Philip Gerhardt, 35, of Staten Island, New York. He shot himself as police officers approached his car to question him.

Secretary Of War Target Of Attack

LONDON, June 16—Lord Ponsonby, former Labor leader in the House of Lords, suggested today that the Secretary for War, Alfred Duff Cooper, should be confined as "a deliberate, dangerous and disgraceful scaremonger."

The Labor peer used sharp language to protest Duff Cooper's statement of yesterday that "it is the duty of those in authority to fight the people of this country out of their wits."

Supreme Court Will Rule On Reform Legislation Today

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, June 16—The Supreme Court of Canada will deliver judgments at 3:30 p.m. A.D.T. tomorrow in the longest and most important constitutional reference in Canada's history. Fate of eight laws passed by the Bennett Government will depend on the decision.

Every man, woman and child in the country will be affected by the decision because the eight laws were of a social nature, the basis of the reform platform of the last government. When the King administration came into office last October the statutes were sent to the court to be tested constitutionally, to be examined in the light of the British North America Act whether they were within the legal

competence of Parliament or invaded provincial legislative fields. The eight laws are: Dominion Trade and Industry Commission Act resulting from the price spreads report, Employment and Social Insurance Act, Minimum Wage Act, 48-hour Week Act, One Day's Rest in Seven Act, Natural Products Marketing Act, Farmers' Creditors Arrangement Act and Section 498a of the Criminal Code which stipulated fines and imprisonment for unfair business practices.

In a general way, the Dominion claimed the laws were constitutional, that Parliament had the legal power to pass them. The provinces attacked their validity, some of them in every respect, others in part.

Troops Mobilized

BRUSSELS, June 16—(A. P.)—Angry Belgian strikers threatening to burn trolleys, paralyzed street car service in Liege tonight.

Mounted police charged with drawn sabres to disperse groups of rowdies during the day.

Police arrested 29 brawlers at Liege, and there were reports that seven foreign agitators also were placed in jail. Gendarme reinforcements were dispatched from Brussels by special train to the Charleroi area.

Although officials stated the country was calm, it became apparent a menacing situation had been created by unruly elements among the 170,000 strikers. Communist agitators were reported active in the important industrial region about Charleroi.

Regular army units were mobilized to keep normal public service functioning, and the Governor of Liege, fortified city near the German frontier, prohibited street assemblies.

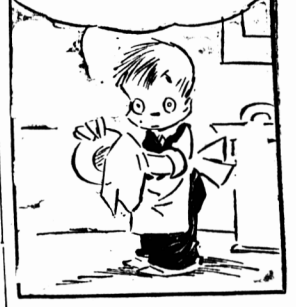
Island Girls Win Prizes At Edgehill School
