METHODIST MINISTER REVIEWS THE RECORD.

make a gentleman; that man in whose hands virtually the helm of the State is, he who is above his master, with whom it is again "Ego et meus rex," that man who has more power in the cabinet than any other, tells us very clearly that he does not believe in making the national debt less, but that he is going to increase it. It is now several millions more than when he and his friends got into power. These gentlemen told us with great lamentation that the national expenditure was growing at an enormous rate; that even in the days of their mourning the backs of hard-tolling Canadians were breaking under the enormous and increasing national expenditure; that if they got into office they would reduce it four millions per annum. Think of it, you broken backed Canadians. Put us, Hypogrits, into office, and we will ease your burdens in running the country, to the tune of four millions. Had they done even this, I might have been spared the necessity of coining a new word to meet the case. But what is the fact? The public expenditure is now bigger by many millions than when they obtained office. As if to make their hypocrisy more evident, the amount now expended is nearly three times as much as they promised it should be made less. All of which leads me to remark, encore, that a Hypogrit is a hypocrite gone to seed.

Eleven millions of an increase in our annual national expenditure, if not alarming, as I think it may well be, is at any rate convincing that these men were hypocrites when they shed tears over the expenditure of five years ago, and Hypogrits when they belie their words and tears by so largely increasing the burdens of which they so lustily complained. When they held out the hope of prohibition it is now very easily seen they were hypocrites, and Hypogrits when they put forth all their efforts to make the majority in favor of it small, and then refuse to give it because the majority is not large enough.

O, ye Hypogrits, I am amazed, not at your hypocrisy, for that I confess I anticipated, but at your stupidity. Hammer away gentlemen! Every day, it seems to a good many intelligent people in Canada, you are driving nails into your own political coffin. Yours, etc.,

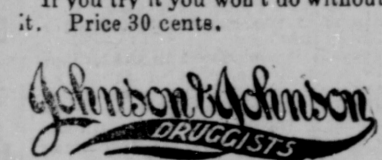
