Coban, from Montreal, arrived here this morning at 7 o'clock, with a cargo of flour and general mdse. She left for St. John's, Nfld., at 12 o'clock, taking a quantity of oats, vegetables, and 20 sheep on deck. Mr. Wm. Wise, Mrs. Wise and Master Wm. Wise, went as passengers. Mr. McLeod for the owner of the cargo asked that he be allowed to pay into court the appraised value of the cargo instead of having it sold, and after a long argument this was allowed by the Court. Two accidents of a rather serious nature occurred at Lower Jemasg, N. B., on Friday last. Mr. Ebro Chase, while engaged in a wrestling bout, fell and broke his leg, which was set by Dr. Caswell. A young girl named Mand Stillwell, while playing near a fire, narrowly escaped being burned to death, her clothes catching fire and burning while on her. Telegraph. A SKETCH of Sebastopol, showing all the fortifications and right and left siege works of the cavalry charge against Leprande's forces, also a view of Inkerman, showing the Russians in full force previous to the attack on the outlying pickets, is on exhibition in the south window of the Diamond Bookstore. It is drawn from memory by Sergeant-Major John Allen—whose stay in the Crimea was 1 year and 310 days and is a faithful sketch of historic Sebastopol. On Monday afternoon an old man named Daniel Gallagher had a very narrow escape from drowning. He was rafting some spars near Messrs. Kirk & Daniel's pond, Portland, when he slipped and fell into the water. His age and the dangerous way in which he fell, rendered his position very perilous, and the accident might have been attended with fatal results but for the prompt and gallant action of Mr. Patrick Brown, a man over 50 years of age, who hastening to the rescue, dove in and succeeded in bringing Gallagher safely to the mill sluice. THE New Brunswick Salvationists carry revolvers. The Moncton Transcript says: "A young man, a member of the Salvation Army, met with a painful accident Tuesday about a mile out of town, on the line of the Northern Division of the I. C. R. He was in the act of putting a cartridge in his revolver when it suddenly went off, the bullet entering the palm of the left hand. Dr. Ross probed for the bullet, but did not succeed in extracting it. Another attempt will be made to extract the bullet. The unfortunate young man is a great sufferer from the accident." The Captain should not allow his soldiers to carry revolvers in times of peace.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) The Quebec Elections. OTTAWA, Oct. 19. Speaking generally the English speaking people of Quebec Province, Irish, Scotch and English, irrespective of creed, supported the Conservative French of the Province against the Riellites. MONTREAL, Oct. 19. The Witness thus explains the success with which Mercier has met in Quebec:—"Liberal journals of Ontario are claiming the result of the elections in this Province as a Liberal victory, a victory over the Government which perpetrated the North Shore Railway and Tanneries Land Swap villainies. This is a great mistake. The victory is one for the Nationalists. The Liberals share it because the Rouges adopted the Nationalist programme. It was the "Riel" cry and the "National" cry which carried the Province. The Ross-Tailion Government has been the most economical one which the Province has ever had, with the exception of Joly's administration, and it has been defeated together with its most honest and popular member—Mr. Taillon—simply because they refused to condemn the Dominion Government for the execution of Riel." Detectives on the Shoot. CHICAGO, Oct. 19. Four hundred Pinkerton detectives were returning to the city from Armour's packing establishment to-day, a settlement of the strike having rendered their further services as guards unnecessary. Before the train moved away a large crowd gathered and commenced jeering the officers. The latter then opened fire upon the crowd with rifles, and two men were fatally wounded and a number more or less injured. The officers claim that the crowd began firing, and that they responded in self defence. Six of the detectives were held on a charge of murder. More Bribery Arrests. NEW YORK, Oct. 19. "Jake" Sharp, the arch plotter in the Broadway bribery business, and "Jim" Richmond, President of the Broadway and Fifth Avenue Roads, were arrested this morning. Both were taken to police headquarters. Ex-President James Foshay, of the Broadway Roads, was also arrested to-day. All were placed under \$50,000 bail. Another Railway Accident. LINCOLN, NEB., Oct. 19. A construction train was thrown from the track nine miles southwest of Fairfield this afternoon. The whole train was precipitated down an embankment 25 feet. Five men were killed outright and nine more or less injured. Satisfied With the Result. LONDON, Oct. 19. The Post says: The Bulgarian Government is satisfied with the result of the elections, and is inclined to negotiate with Russia regarding the election of a prince to the vacant throne. The Double Scull Race. WORCESTER, MASS., Oct. 19. The three mile double scull race this afternoon, between Hosmer and McKay, of Boston, and Enright and O'Connor, of Toronto, was won by the former in 18m. 23s. Assigned. NEW YORK, Oct. 19. Barremore & Co., dealers in hops, made an assignment to-day. Their liabilities are \$925,000; nominal assets nearly the same amount. Another Man Gone Wrong. MONTREAL, Oct. 19. P. T.
