A second tourney is to commence soon with nine rinks slated to participate.

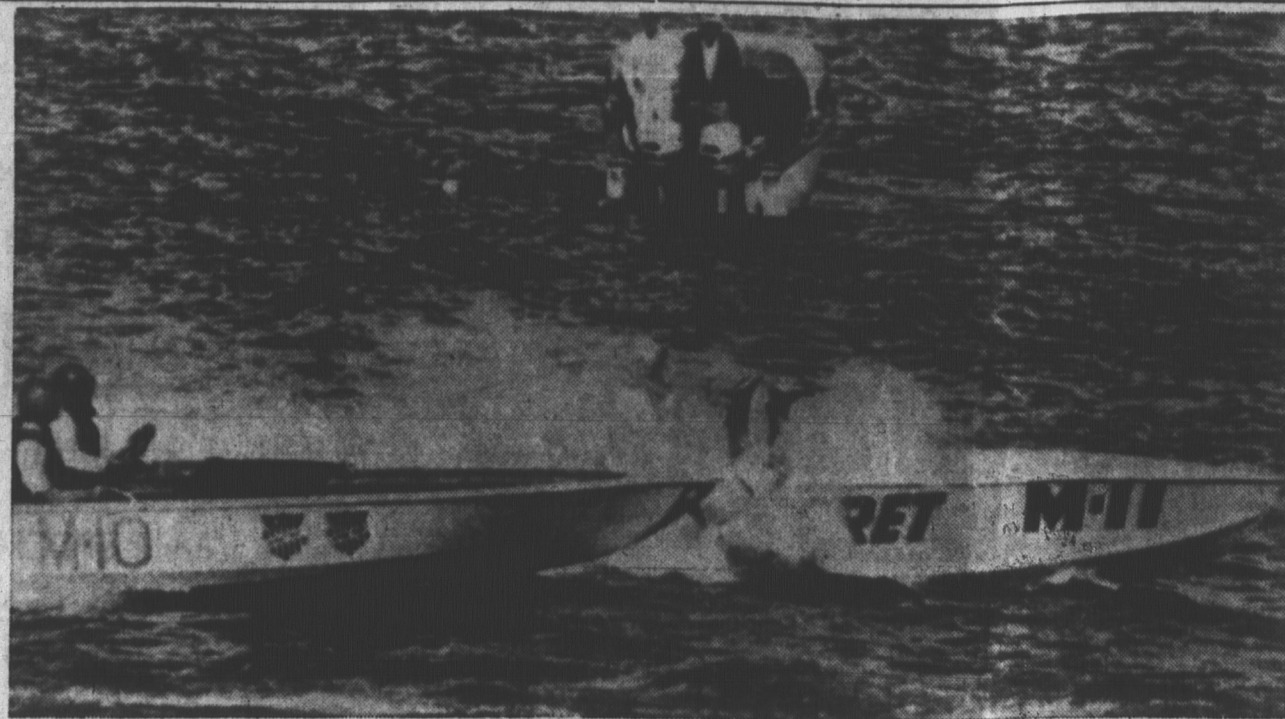
## Souris 'Bones' Rattle Hawks

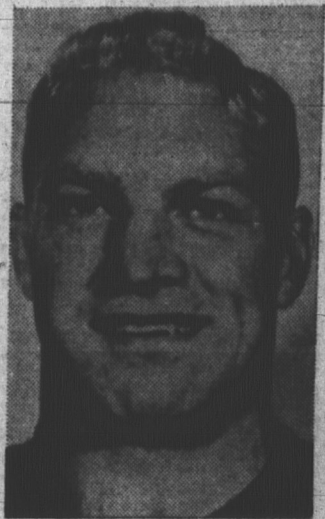
# 3 Chicago Black Hawks Named To AP Dream Team

**NEW YORK (AP)** - Bobby Hull of Chicago Black Hawks, this season's goal-scoring leader, and Gordie Howe of Detroit Red Wings, the career pacesetter, were named Monday to The Associated Press' National Hockey League all-star team for the first half of the 1965-6 season.

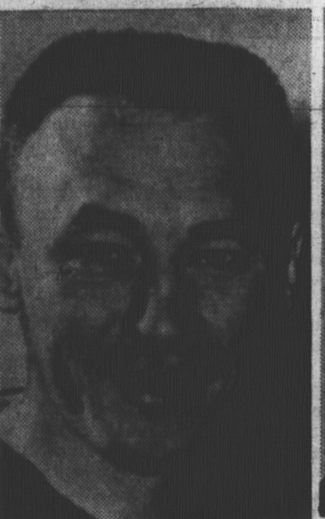
Hull, 27-year-old left winger, paces the NHL with 36 goals, including the four he scored Sunday against New York Rangers. Howe, 37-year-old right winger, has 16 goals this year for a career high of 611. Howe is in his 20th NHL season.

Others named to the first team were Norm Ullman of Detroit, defenceman Jacques Laperriere of Montreal Canadiens and netminder Glenn Hall and defenceman Pierre Pilote of the Black Hawks.

on the second team. Goaltender Roger Crozier and defenceman Doug Barkley represented Detroit, while the Rangers chosen were defenceman Harry Howell and left wing Don Marshall. Stan Mikita of the Hawks, a centre, and Bobby Rousseau of the Canadiens, a right winger, were the others selected for the second team.

Named to the third team were centre Bob Pulford, left winger Frank Mahovlich and defenceman Allan Stanley of Toronto Maple Leafs; right winger Bob Nevin of the Rangers, goaltender Gump Worsley of Montreal and defenceman Matt Ravlich of Chicago.

The first half of the 70-game NHL season ended Saturday.
