Poor Pastures Cause Farmers To Use Winter Feed Stocks

With the hay crop practically harvested and the condition of pastures plainly apparent, cattlemen must now take stock of the situation. Generally many farmers seem to be in the situation of having enough good quality hay for the winter feeding season. The real problem is the period during the next three months. Already hay is being fed and this means in some cases a shortage will occur next winter.

What can be done? First of all it would appear to be wise policy to harvest all the hay that is available. A few hundred bales of hay obtained from another farm or from a pasture which has grown up will really be an asset next spring. Next in acute cases oats could be cured and made into hay. This would, of course, produce another product of the British and Foreign Bible Society, special speaker.

EDUCATIONAL ASSISTANCE

Again we would refer to the generous assistance available to Island students taking the farm course at Truro. An allowance per day, bursaries and scholarship are available to an extent which assure practical cost free education.

Last week the Canadian Federation of Agriculture held its semi-annual board meeting in Winnipeg. Probably the more important matters considered were feed grain assistance, farm credit policy, unemployment insurance, national health services, the problem of pesticides and insecticides in relation to food contamination, expropriation of properties, Canada Pension Plan.

Also considered were possible involvement in three proposed conferences, one would be related to ARDA, another to national health services and one on the pollution problem. In relation to the above conference the decision to be made is whether the federation becomes a sponsor and is represented.

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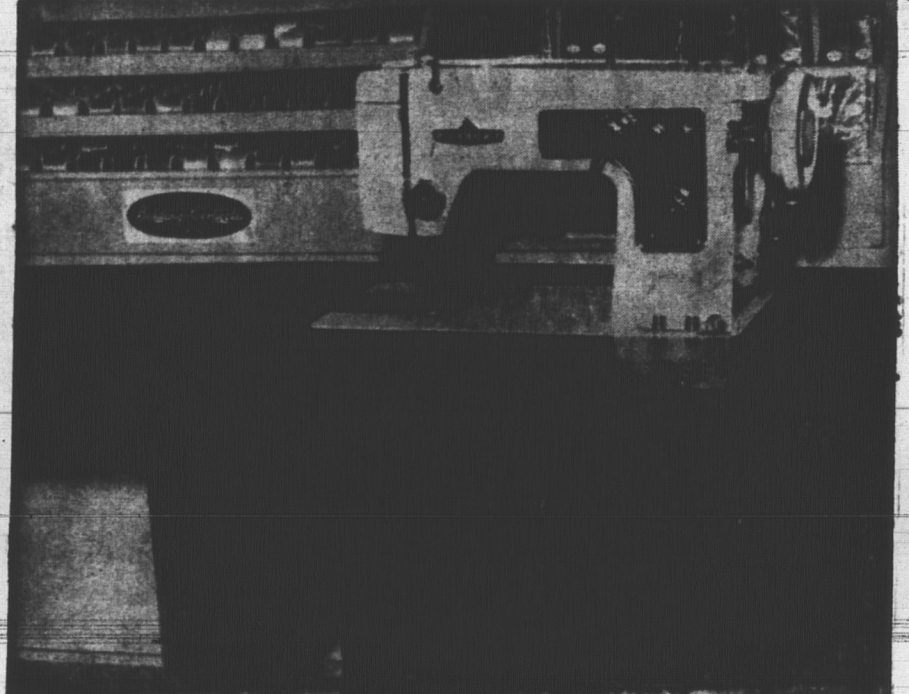
