



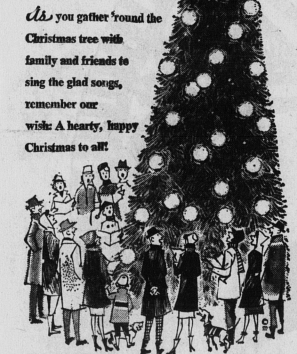

More Funds Are Urged For Medical Research

OTTAWA (CP)—Dr. R. F. Farquharson, chairman of the Medical Research Council, says it is vital that more funds be made available to support medical research in Canadian universities and hospitals.
He makes the statement in the annual report of the council which administers federal government activities in the field of medical research. The main part of the council's work is the distribution of grants for research projects and for paying the salaries of scientists doing this work.
Dr. Farquharson, professor emeritus of medicine at the University of Toronto, says two important factors currently limit the growth of medical research in Canadian universities and hospitals. The first was an inadequacy of university and hospital funds with which to pay full-time salaries to teachers and scientists. This need was being met only in part by the Medical Research Council.
"The other limiting factor is the long-standing shortage of medical research laboratories and the expensive facilities they involve," Dr. Farquharson says. "This shortage now is far more critical than ever before and no research granting bodies have the funds with which to meet it. It is vital, however, that some way be found to do so in the near future."
Dr. Farquharson says Canada's requirements for the continued development of medical research likely are to increase rapidly for many years.
"The most important investment in medical science is to educate students well and to train gifted young graduates in the art and practice of research. This can only be accom-

plished when the teachers themselves understand medical science and have practised it. Many more teachers - scientists are needed now, both because of the expansion of our medical schools and because of the rapid growth of medical science."

Germans Agree With Eisenhower

FRANKFURT (AP) — German war-time commanders have agreed with General Dwight D. Eisenhower's opinion the Allied demand for German unconditional surrender in the Second World War was a mistake.
Gen. Adolf Heusinger said: "... I am convinced German resistance had ended because of this Allied demand."
Heusinger, fired in a purge after the abortive plot on Adolf Hitler's life July 20, 1944, had been head of the army's operational division.
Gen. Hans Speidel said he contended in a biographical sketch first published in 1949, the demand for unconditional surrender was a grave mistake.
Speidel was chief of staff to Field Marshal Erwin Rommel during the allied invasion in 1944 and was arrested after the July 20 plot.

World's Champ Picked In Battle Of Gluttons

GÖTEBORG, Sweden (AP) — A local "world champion" has been crowned here after a savage scrap in the ancient and manly Nordic art of feasting on outside holiday meals.
The battle of gluttons at a Göteborg restaurant was fought out by two reputed local gourmands.
Still champion is Sten-Ake Cedehöök, 32. He felled his opponent in the final round by partaking of 8.92 pounds of food from a Christmas table of some 60 courses.
The young challenger, Ake Eriksson, represented the lively newspaper Göteborgs-

until defending champion Cedehöök floored his opponent for a TKO with 2½ ounces of pastepuffs and jam.
GETS TUMMY ACHES
As the bell went for round five, the challenger stayed in his corner complaining about stomach pains. Both fighters had passed the 8½ - pound mark.
But the eating game is a tough business and valiant Eriksson ground his teeth and decided to hang on, weakly taking some coffee.
The traditional Swedish Christmas table is comparable to a big smorgasbord, although with added traditional Christmas treats.
The combatants were weighed before and after the siege of the smorgasbord, under supervision of the Göteborg Professional Eating Commission. Champion Cedehöök, weighing in at 233.00 pounds, afterwards tipped the scales at 238.48, while the challenger registered 229.58 and 233.64.
The bout lasted two hours.

'Cure' Founder Sent To Court

PARIS (Reuters) — Self-taught biologist Gaston Naessens, who claimed he discovered a cure for leukaemia, has been ordered to appear before a court here in April.
Naessens, who went to Montreal last April, will be called answer charges of practicing medicine and pharmacy illegally.
If found guilty, Naessens faces fines of up to 18,000 francs (\$3,600) on each count and heavy court costs from extensive tests made on his anaebal serum, which French health authorities have declared worthless.
Naessens went to Montreal to treat a child who later died of leukaemia.
The official French report, which Naessens himself requested, said the serum is made of distilled water and kitchen salt and has traces of phenol.
Naessens and his serum first sprang into the news a year ago when several British children were flown to Corsica to be treated.

Potash Sought In N.S. Area

HALIFAX (CP) — The Nova Scotia government plans to survey a 450-50-square mile area near Wallace, N.S., for potash possibilities.
An article in the current issue of the Royal Gazette closes the area to private prospectors until June 30. A mines department official said here this closure was extended if plans for the survey go ahead.
