MONTAGUE — A native of Kensington, P.E.I., is making a name for himself as folk painter in the Canadian West, after retiring nine years ago from the practice of law in Saskatoon. W.N. Stewart, who now lives in Vancouver, has just completed a one-man exhibition of paintings in the Vancouver Art Gallery.

He was born in Kensington in 1888 and after attending Prince of Wales College, taught for four years. He entered the University of Saskatchewan in 1916 and received his law degree in 1919, being the first student to win the Wetmore scholarship at the university.

Greek Archbishop Dies In London

LONDON (Reuters) — Archbishop Athanasios, 78, head of the Greek Orthodox Church in Western and central Europe, died in hospital here Monday after a 14-week illness, it was learned.

The archbishop was spiritual leader of Greek Orthodox in a zone stretching from the North Pole to the shores of Africa and from Spain to the borders of the Soviet Union.

For a time he was chancellor of the archdiocese in North America in New York. He was founder of the Greek Theological Institute in Boston, Mass. He returned to London in 1957.

"our people do not have the desire to market their products." He blamed this in part on deep-seated complacency toward the past and a general defeatist attitude toward the future. Another reason was the slow pace of regional development.

Philip Backman, APEC vice-president and Halifax advertising executive, said he disagreed with the idea that Maritimeers are a breed apart. It was a misconception that if you want to sell in this region you have to use different methods, consumers were basically the same everywhere.

"This attitude is debilitating," he said. "It stunts our growth, preserves and fosters our self-lamented regional disadvantages, and contributes to the erroneous picture so many other Canadians have of us."

Maritimers had their peculiarities, but so did Prairie farmers. One resisted change no more than the other. How else could you explain the spread of supermarket shopping centres and sale of packaged goods throughout the Atlantic region?

E. H. Keraghagan, general manager of Simpson-Sears Limited in Halifax and president of the maritimes Provinces Board of Trade, said Atlantic provinces producers have no right to expect Maritime consumers to give them special preference.

"The consumer takes the shot. He's going to buy equal quality at the lowest price he can." Maritime producers had to meet that test.

"One of the projects we have in mind is a very comprehensive study of conservation. This subject comes into the realm of both adult and junior education."
