LAND SINKS 160 FEET

FAHLER, Alta. (CP)—A strip of land four miles long and a half-mile wide near here has sunk 150 feet below the normal surface, mystifying residents of the district 275 miles northwest of Edmonton. The tract started to drop early last week.

Says N. S. Must Be Fast Province

WHITEBY, Ont. (CP)—A former Nova Scotia man who said it was nothing unusual for him to drive 85 miles an hour on highways in his home province was found guilty Tuesday of dangerous driving.

Wendell Morris, 26, now of Toronto, was fined \$50 and had his operator's permit suspended for one year.

Police said Morris was driving between 85 and 90 miles an hour on a highway.

When Morris told the court there was no speed limit in Nova Scotia, Magistrate Frank Ebbs said: "It must be a fast province."

REGINA (CP) — City council Tuesday night outlawed hitch-hiking in Regina. W. W. Spicer, traffic board secretary, said the board is concerned over the danger incurred by persons standing on streets soliciting rides.

Edmundston To Pay Damages

OTTAWA, (CP)—The Supreme Court of Canada Tuesday ordered the city of Edmundston, N. B., to pay \$22,569 damages to Wilfrid Label and his son, Claude, who was burned by grasping two live electrical wires on city property.

The decision upheld a judgment of the New Brunswick court of appeal which awarded \$17,000 to the 17-year-old youth and \$5,569 to his father.

Claude Label, then 13 years old, was injured in 1950 when he grasped the wires running through the back of the grandstand in the Municipal ball park.

The Labels sued both the city, owners of the stadium, and the Edmundston Baseball Association Ltd., who held a lease on the field and the grandstand.

Judge C. J. Jones of Madawaska county court ordered the baseball club to pay \$22,569 damages, but dismissed the action against the city.
