LARGE DEATH RATE.—The mortality returns of Montreal for July are exceptionally heavy, aggregating 693 deaths, 98 Protestant and 555 Roman Catholic. The infant mortality totalled 243 from diarrhoeal diseases; 17 children died from diphtheria. From zymotic diseases the deaths were: Diphtheria, 40; typhoid, 7; scarlatina, 6, and measles, 16.

HE STOLE AN OX AND SOLD IT.—A butcher named Lanor, of Dartmouth, N. S., one day last week, bought an ox for \$25 from a colored man, who gave his name as Boyd, of Fall River. Having received \$20 Boyd departed, promising to call at Mr. J. B. McLean's for the remaining \$5. Shortly after Boyd left Mr. Lanor called upon by a second colored man, a Mr. Cribley, who said the ox had been stolen from him. At ten o'clock Saturday morning Boyd, who gave his name as Albert Downey, called at McLean's for his money. Word was sent to the police, who arrested Boyd alias Downey, and took him to the police station. When searched \$13 was found on his person.

DORCHESTER PENITENTIARY.—Reports received from this institution indicate inefficiency somewhere among those entrusted with the confinement of the prisoners at night. A short time ago several prisoners, by some means or other, sprung the locks of the doors in their cells and got out in the corridors, but their plans of escape were frustrated by one of the guards, who had been attracted by the noise they had made. Recently two other prisoners ran away from the institution; the latter, it seems, had been outside the enclosure. They were fired on by the guards, the informant says, and one of them, who is believed to be a prisoner from Charlottetown undergoing a sentence for murder, was shot in the arm. Both were re-captured.—St. John Telegraph.

THE LADIES' COLLEGE.—The full term of this popular and flourishing institution opens on the 30th inst. under extremely favorable auspices. Rev. Principal Borden, in his determination to keep fully abreast of the progress of the age, has provided a new course of study. Miss E. P. OTTAWA, Aug. 14. Disturbing doubts have risen as to the guilt or innocence of William Millman, lately hanged at Charlottetown, P. E. I., for the murder of his sweetheart. Evidence has been laid before the Minister of Justice which, if true, proves that Millman's life was sworn away by a person implicated in the murder.

Montreal Murmurings.

MONTREAL, Aug. 14. The authorities here have at last resolved to take action against the bucket shops. Another party of 25 male Chinese arrived here yesterday in bond for New York. A man named James Kelly was crushed to death by a case of glass which fell on him.

Letter Box Thieves.

CHICAGO, Aug. 14. Frederick Von Berkampf and Thomas McKivere were arrested to-day and each held in \$5000. There wholesale robbery of letter boxes has extended over two years and involved thefts aggregating over \$1,000,000.

Remitting Rents.

KINGSTON, Ont., Aug. 14. Many landlords in the neighborhood of Morven are remitting portions of their tenants rents, owing to crop failure, so that they may not be crippled in their future operations.

The New Commander.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14. The President issued an order to-day placing Major-General Schofield in command of the army, with headquarters at Washington. General Schofield will also continue in command of the Division of the Atlantic.

OTTAWA, Aug. 14. Lieut. Col. Bacon is making provision for the attendance of about 400 riflemen at the forthcoming Dominion matches. This will be far in excess of any previous number.
