The annual meeting of the Summerside branch of the Red Cross Society was held yesterday afternoon in the Town Hall with, as usual, many reports of excellent and extensive work carried out during the year. The President, Mr. J. F. Arnett, presided and the entire slate of officers was re-elected for another term.

The slate is as follows: President, J. F. Arnett; vice president, Miss Carrie Holman; co-chairman of women's work, Mrs. R. L. Willet and Mrs. Victor Travers; treasurer, Mrs. W. F. Strong; secretary, Mrs. H. Green; executive, Mrs. Helen Dickson and Mrs. D. F. McNeill. Provincial executive members: blood donors, Mr. W. A. Currie; first aid, Dr. Austin DeJany; swimming and water safety, Mr. Ross MacKenzie; Home Makers' Service, Miss Millicent Strong.

At the beginning of the meeting Mr. Arnett referred to the death during the year of his predecessor as president, Mr. John E. Campbell, and of Mrs. Ernest Mills, who had been an active Red Cross worker. The members observed a minute's silence in memory of these departed members.

Commends Members Mr. Arnett commended the members for their fine work during the year and reminded them that the Red Cross campaign for funds will be held in the near future. He said that last year this province did not reach its objective and he felt that the great need for funds should be stressed and the fine work that the Red Cross does should be pointed out.

Mr. Arnett then welcomed His Worship, Mayor Henry Wedge, who addressed the meeting briefly, complimenting the members on the excellent work that is being done.

The treasurer's report was presented by the treasurer, Mrs. W. F. Strong. It was disclosed in the statement of receipts and expenditures that bequests had been made to the Society in the amount of \$100 from the late Marlon Holland and in the amount of \$109.85 from the late Grace Beaty. Donations had been received for disaster relief amounting to \$200.25 and the sum of \$339.25 had been paid out for this purpose to headquarters in Charlottetown. The sum of \$800.00 was paid to the fund for the Home Makers' Service.

Mr. W. A. Currie's report for the Blood Donor's Clinic showed that there had been 420 donors during the past year but the point out that this is not sufficient for local needs. The report on swimming and water safety was handed in by Mr. Kenneth Callbeck, representing the Y's Men's Club. It showed that 200 persons had been enrolled last summer and 140 had received awards.

Provides Good Service Miss Millicent Strong gave the report for the Home Makers' committee which provided competent assistance in homes where there are children and the mother is ill. Fifty-seven calls had been received and 518 days of service given. Mrs. Victor Travers reported for the sick room supply loan service and said that 60 articles had been loaned during the year, including hospital beds and wheel chairs, which had been of great benefit to the people concerned.

Miss Gladys Holman reported for women's work and said that 1300 articles had been shipped out for the needy in Europe and that 25 blankets had been donated through the branch for Manitoba flood relief. She expressed gratitude to Women's Institutes, Church organizations and individuals for assistance. Also 125 articles had been given to the Prince County Hospital.

Mrs. W. F. Strong paid a special tribute to the work that is being done by Miss Gladys Holman for the Red Cross and through it for the people of the country. She said she would like the people to know of her efforts which are untiring.
