

Chamberlain Signs New Player; Hockey School Opens Tonight At Forum

Manager-coach Murph Chamberlain announced last night the signing of another player to the Islanders roster, Charlotte town's entry in the Maritime Senior Hockey League this season.

The new addition to the club is Frank Bathgate of Guelph, Ontario, and comes here well recommended by Frank Boucher, manager of the New York Rangers hockey club of the N. H. L.

Bathgate plays centre ice position, is 5' 11", weighs about 170 pounds. He played with Guelph Biltmore Juniors last year but has been performing at the New York Rangers camp this season.

Coach Chamberlain also announced the times for practice sessions of his four-day hockey school which will get underway at the Forum tonight at eight o'clock. The time will be 10 a. m. in the morning and 3 p. m. in the afternoon on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, with the school closing on the afternoon of the latter day.

The purpose of the school is to select players from the local crop of hockeyists who have the ability to latch on to the Islanders' Club. Any hockeyist in the Province who thinks he might have the where-with-all to make the grade is invited to take part in the school. All players must turn out fully equipped.

Those picked from the school by Chamberlain as likely prospects will turn out with the regular squad of "imports" in the first regular practice session, scheduled for Saturday morning at 10 o'clock. The regular session was scheduled for Friday originally, but it was felt that it would be advisable to extend it a day in order to conclude the school first.

Team-making has been going on since last Friday night at the Forum, and with careful building up of the surface day by day, everything will be in readiness for tonight's opening session.

Moncton Hawks Sign Left Wingers

MONCTON, N. B., Oct. 2.—(CP)—Moncton Hawks of the Maritime Senior Hockey League tonight released the names of two left wingers who will be joining the club when training starts Oct. 8.

They are Mike Demchuk, last season with Saint John Beavers, and a former member of the Hawks, and Trent Anderson, high scoring member of last season's Glace Bay Miners of the Cape Breton Hockey League.

In announcing acquisition of the two wingers, Coach Gordie Drillon said he expected the two newcomers to add firepower to the Hawks front lines.

Anderson, a native of Welland, Ont., was a prolific goal-getter with the Miners last season. Demchuk was sixth in the M. S. H. L. scoring last season with 86 points.

Another defenceman will be added to the lineup, Drillon said. He believed that with a 78-game schedule facing them, Hawks will need the inside help provided by a fifth rearguard. He declined to reveal the name of the player he had in mind, but said he is well known in the Maritimes and turned in a good performance last season.

Drillon said that reports reaching him from Quebec City were that defenceman Bill Elance of last year's Hawks was showing up well in practice sessions with Quebec Aces. No word has been received by the Hawks club from LeBlanc and it was not known whether he would be returning to Moncton.

Phillies Short Of Pitchers For World Series

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 2.—(AP)—Philadelphia Phillies, who weren't supposed to win the National League pennant but did, may fool the experts again.

Still, they don't figure to beat New York Yankees in the World Series.

The Yankees have greater experience, a deeper bench and much stronger pitching. They should win the inexperienced Phils in five games.

To win a seven-game series, a team must have excellent pitching. That is something the Yankees have and the Phils have not.

True, the Phils own in Robin Roberts a hurler who may be as good as anybody on the Yankee staff. But after Roberts, what? The Phils own the flag on the work of Robegas, Curt Simmons, Bob Miller and Bubba Church—plus the spectacular relief pitching of 33-year-old Jim Konstanty.

Simmons has gone into the army. Miller appears to have lost the combination that made him an early season sensation. Church hasn't recovered fully from a face injury three weeks ago.

That leaves Roberts the sole effective survivor among the juveniles. He may get some help from veterans Russ Meyer and Ken Heintzelman. But much of the strength that enabled the Phils to pile up such a commanding lead has been dissipated in one way or another. What they have left may be enough to stop the American Leaguers. But the odds are against it.

The Yankees, on the other hand, possess an experienced quartet in Vic Raschi, Allie Reynolds, Eddie Lopat and Tommy Byrne. Each has been through the post-season grind. In addition, the Yankees have a clever young freshman southpaw in Eddie Ford, who has the poise of a veteran.

The Yankees appear to have the edge in all departments. As usual, the American League has the power, the long-ball hitters. Only Del Ennis and Andy Seminick and perhaps the slump-ridden Willie Jones among the Phils are home run threats. Dick Sisler, hero of the Phils' pennant clinching victory, occasionally hits a long one as he did against Brooklyn. But he doesn't hit them often enough.

This group doesn't compare with Joe DiMaggio, Johnny Mize, Yogi Berra and Hank Bauer in slug-ging. The Yankees also have a good 300 hitter in Phil Rizzuto, a candidate for the League's most valuable player.

Vic Raschi To Hurl Opening Game For Yankees

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—(AP)—Manager Casey Stengel today named righthander Vic Raschi to hurl the opening game of the World Series Wednesday and scooped at the betting odds which established the Yankees as heavy favorites over Philadelphia Phils.

"Raschi is my man," the Yankee skipper told reporters who had gone out to Yankee Stadium to watch the American League champions work out.

"Vic has been my big pitcher all year. He deserves the first shot." Casey said. Allie Reynolds (16-12) definitely will start the second game. He thinks his third pitcher might be southpaw Ed Lopat (18-8).

Told that the Phils are underdogs at odds ranging from 2 to 1 to 13 to 5, Casey guffawed.

"Those betting people know from nothing," he said. "That's a good ball club over in Philadelphia. It had to be good to beat a red hot Brooklyn team in the biggest game of the year for both clubs."

"Of course I think we'll win but they've got some tough pitchers. That's the only way they can win—if they get great pitching. I don't think they'll outslug us."

Stengel said he has a great deal of respect for pitchers Koblin Roberts, Ken Heintzelman, Russ Meyer and Bubba Church.

Raschi has appeared in two World Series but has never opened one. His season's record is 21-8. Stengel said he has not heard from the Phils who were reported to have asked permission to play two ineligible men in the World Series, outfielder Jack Mayo and pitcher Jocko Thompson. In place of Bill Nicholson and Curt Simmons, Nicholson is in hospital with diabetes and Simmons is in the army.

"If the Phils want permission to use those men," Casey said, "I'll ask to make Johnny Hopp eligible."

Hopp, purchased from Pittsburgh after the deadline date, is not eligible. He could be used as a replacement either in the outfield or at first base.

The opening day line-up as announced by Stengel: Gene Woodling, left field; Phil Rizzuto, shortstop; Larry Berry, catcher; Joe DiMaggio, centre field; Johnny Mize, first base; Hank Bauer or Cliff Mapes, right field; Billy Johnson or Bobby Brown, third base; Gerry Coleman, second base; Vic Raschi, pitcher.

The right field and third base starters will depend on the Phils' pitching selection. Bauer and Johnson will start if the Phils nominate a lefthander. Mapes and Brown would be in the line-up against a righthander.

Buying Price Of Gold Placed On Pre-War Basis

OTTAWA, Oct. 2.—(CP)—The Government today placed the buying price for gold back on its pre-war basis.

The buying price for gold now, with the Canadian dollar freed of restrictions, will be governed by the free market fluctuation rather than by the fixed exchange rates prevailing until last week-end.

Under new Canadian gold producers must sell the bulk of their output to the Royal Canadian Mint.

The Government said today its gold buying price now will be \$35 a fine ounce, United States funds, converted into Canadian dollars weekly at the average noon rate of premium Monday through Friday. The price will be determined thus:

The daily noon rate will be reported to the Finance Department.

by the Bank of Canada Monday through Friday. The average of this rate for the five days will dictate the premium to be paid on the \$35-an-ounce rate for gold delivered to the mint during that week.

Thus, if the week's noontime buying rates for U. S. funds average a five-per-cent premium, the seller of gold would be paid \$35 an ounce plus five per cent.

The gold-price announcement was the only official development here in a day which saw the newly-freed dollar swing in a price range of roughly 93 to 95 cents in terms of U. S. funds on the world's money markets. Under the officially-controlled rate which ended during the week-end, it had a fixed price of 90 cents.

In the gold field, the Government also is restoring to its full rate a production subsidy initiated in 1947 to assist new and so-called marginal mines, those with a low grade of ore and consequent high cost of production.

A year ago, when the Canadian dollar was devalued to a discount of 10 per cent, the Government reduced the gold production subsidy by \$3.50 an ounce.
