V-E Day Anniversary Observance At Side

What does V-E day mean to you? Possibly very little - but to the thousands of soldiers, sailors and airmen who served their country in time of war it means that on that day, May 8, 1945, the Second World War in Europe had come to an end. It meant victory for the Allied forces in Europe and to all servicemen it meant going home.
