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LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

THE STANLEY.—Returned to Georgetown on Saturday evening and the passengers were brought to the city by special train, arriving about midnight. She left Georgetown for Pictou this morning at seven o'clock, and left Pictou for Charlottetown at half-past one.

Y. M. C. A.—Mr. R. R. FitzGerald addressed the meeting yesterday afternoon, his subject being "unselfishness." The address is highly spoken of. At the close remarks appropriate to the occasion were made by Messrs. F. S. Moore, J. D. Seaman, Dr. H. D. Johnson and Dr. Ayers.

THEATRICAL.—The managers of "Hand Across the Sea" Company, now playing at the Bowdoin Square Theatre, Boston, and the "True Irish Hearts" Company, playing in Watertown, N. Y. are negotiating for the use of the Masonic Temple Opera House. Both companies contemplate playing in Charlottetown next month.

THE NORTHEAST.—Arrived at Summerside from Point du Chene on Saturday afternoon. She left that port for Charlottetown yesterday forenoon, but after getting as far as St. Peter's Island was obliged to put back on account of thick weather and heavy drift ice. She left Summerside for Point du Chene at 12.30 this morning, and will be due on return this evening.

THE TRIP.—At the recent meeting of the Directors of the Summerside Driving Park, Messrs. James A. Sharp and H. Hunt were re-elected President and Secretary respectively. It was decided to hold a race meeting at Summerside on Dominion Day, the following being the programme agreed upon: Three-minute class, 2.50 class, and 2.40 class. The purse in each class is \$100, a total of \$300 for the meeting, and the 2.40 class is open to trotters and pacers.

THE RIFLE.—The first competition for a handsome silver medal presented by Messrs. Beer and Sprague of Montague Bridge, came off at that place on Wednesday last. Besides the medal there were a number of money prizes and prizes in kind. The ranges were 200, 400, 500 and 600 yards, 7 shots at each. C. Deane made the highest score, 122 points, and D. Robertson came second with 113 points. The medal must be won twice by the one person before it becomes his property.

LAWYERS.—The annual meeting of the Charlottetown Bar was held on Saturday evening, when the following officers were elected: President, F. H. Arnauld; vice-president, L. E. Brecken; secretary, Wm. A. Weeks; Jr.; committee with Messrs. A. Bartlett and D. B. Stewart. Four new members were elected. The question of holding the Maritime tournament here this summer was up for consideration, but nothing definite having been done, the matter was reserved for the next meeting.

OUR RAILWAYS.

A Large Increase in Traffic and Earnings.

The Report of the Minister of Railways shows that there are 65 main lines of railways in operation in the Dominion. The number of miles of completed railway is 15,229, 2,012 miles of siding. The number of miles in continuous operation is 10,620. Compared with the returns for 1892 this shows an increase during the year of 11 per cent. The gross earnings for 1893 were \$25,488,571, an increase of 11.5 per cent. over 1892. The net earnings were \$13,930,478, an increase of 14.8 per cent. over 1892. The total mileage for 1893 was 15,229 miles, an increase of 1.5 per cent. over 1892. The total mileage for 1892 was 14,980 miles.
