THE APPLE TREE.—During this season, up to the present time, nearly 120,000 lbs. of apples, from Annapolis and Cornwallis Counties have been sent to the market by the Farmers and Hall line of Exchange, and it is estimated that there are still in the land of Evangeline nearly 500,000 lbs. to go forward.

HEARD A SPECIAL.—On Saturday morning a Catholic priest missed the train at Truro, and having the necessities of his church in Cape Breton in view, hired a special train at a cost of \$45 to overtake the express, which he did at New Glasgow, though he had to leave that place without his dinner.—St. John Sun.

COUNTY PRODUCE.—There are sixteen pieces Edward Island and Gloucester County schooners at the wharves with produce and live stock. Oats are selling for 24 cents per bushel, potatoes at 63 cents per barrel, herring \$3.50, codfish \$3 and \$3.50. In the live stock line an ordinary cow can be bought for \$12, and pigs are selling all the way from \$2 to \$6.50. Live geese bring \$1.20 per pair, and turkeys the same price.—Chatham World.

SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK.—Prof. Hamill, of Illinois, a delegate from the International Sunday School Association, gave an address in Zion Church basement last evening to a large audience. THE CANADA'S GOOD RUM.—A Liverpool dispatch of the 24th inst. says: "The Dominion Line's new twin screw steamer Canada passed Tor Head, Ireland, this morning from Montreal on her first eastward trip. The distance from Father Point, Que., to Liverpool, via Belleisle, is approximately 2,500 knots. The Canada passed Father Point on Saturday last at 1:35 p. m."
