Stress Achievements Of Red Cross Meeting

At the recent meeting of the Provincial Red Cross Executive a letter was read from the National Commissioner, Dr. W. S. Stanbury, in which he pointed out the positive achievements of the International Red Cross Conference because of the undue emphasis which was placed on the bitter accusations made by the Communist representatives. The following are pertinent excerpts from this letter:

"For the first time in history, the representatives of some 65 governments, as well as their National Red Cross Societies, in spite of conflicting ideologies and open war, sat at one conference table. The fact that this could occur in the troubled world of today is of paramount significance. It could not possibly take place under any other auspices than the Red Cross. There is no other world forum, including the General Assembly of the United Nations, where all countries could have representation and take part in the various decisions which appeared on the Conference agenda. It is also significant that the Conference was convened under the banner of the Red Cross, the sole international humanitarian organization to which all nations can and do belong.

"There are those who vehemently protested the presence of Communist delegates and still others who believe, and may still believe, that after their repeated charges and propaganda the Communists should be excluded from this great international movement. It must be remembered, however, that the Red Cross was born on a battlefield and it was war and strife which fundamentally make the Red Cross still necessary.

Humanitarian Principles
"The Red Cross is not and should not be concerned with political ideologies, but with humanitarian principles and action which, if applied on an international scale, bring aid and comfort wherever there is suffering, whether caused by war or natural disaster. To exclude the Communists or any other large group of the world's population from a Red Cross Conference would be to forego the last hope of applying universally to humanitarian principles and would prevent partial application of the Geneva Conventions.
