Buckpasser Wins Over \$1 Million

NEW YORK (CP) — Buck Passer came from far off the pace in a stretch drive Saturday to win the \$26,500 Travers at Saratoga race course in Saratoga Springs, N.Y., and boosted his earnings to more than \$1,000,000.

The son of Tom Fool-Busanda, carrying the black silks of Oden Phipps, earned \$33,600 for his ninth straight victory in 10 starts this year and boosted his bank account to \$1,038,369.

Only Kelso, Round Table, Nashua, Carry Back and Citation won more than \$1,000,000, and Buckpasser became the first three-year-old to be admitted to the group. He did it by matching the track record of 2:01.35 for the 1 1/4 miles.

His three-quarter-length triumph over Reginald Webster's Amberind, winner of the Belmont Stakes, came after Buckpasser's many backers in the crowd of 28,014, had all but given up hope.

Buckpasser paid \$2.60, \$2.20 and \$2.20. Amberind paid \$4 and \$2.90 and buffle \$2.20.

Total of \$343,433 was wagered on the race, with \$266,600 of it on the Buckpasser combine, creating a \$38,256.20 minus pool.

Swinging Mood, a three-year-old filly owned by Louis Wolfson of Miami Beach, Fla., led all the way and won the \$55,750 Arlington Matron handicap at Arlington Park in Chicago.

Margarethen, 3-to-1 favorite in the grass race for fillies and mares, finished six lengths behind in second place.

Swinging Mood, ridden by Earle Fines, went the 1 1/4 miles under 112 pounds in 1:48.35, and paid \$12.80, \$6 and \$4.40. Margarethen returned \$4.40 and \$3.40. American's show price was \$7.20.

At Cleveland, Jolly Jet flashed to victory in the \$31,000-added Buckeye handicap at Randall Park race track, edging Gauchesco by half a length.

Lemon Twist finished third, three lengths back.

Helen Gagnon Captures Connaught Gold Cup

HALIFAX (CP) — Helen Gagnon, an inexhaustible French Canadian with a booming drive and a sharp putt, was happily toting the big Duchess of Connaught gold cup around the Ashburn clubhouse Saturday only minutes after capturing the Canadian women's open golf championship in her national debut.

Wearing a big smile but saying little, the 18-year-old brunette from Arvida, Que., was surrounded by an unfamiliar throng of officials and fans who had watched her tense, day-long battle against Gayle Hitchens of Vancouver, a poised 22-year-old who had won the open crown in 1965 and finished second in 1961 and 1964.

Miss Gagnon had to go to the 37th hole of the final match before submitting the scrambling Miss Hitchens, whose earlier expression of fondness for match-play competition was borne up by her comeback from a four-hole deficit to go one up at one stage of the championship play-off.

It took five days of cut-throat competition and surprising upsets before Miss Gagnon and Miss Hitchens survived to meet in the 36-hole final.

Betty Cole of Regina, member of Canada's 1965 World Cup team, failed to qualify after the opening medal-play round last Tuesday and the next day Gail Harvey Moore of Scarborough, Ont., won a World team competition for last year and 1965 Canadian close championship was eliminated by another Vicki Larson of St. David's, Ont.

The final upset came Thursday when Barbara Renwick of Vancouver, runner up in the 1966 close event, at neighboring Dartmouth the previous week, defeated Marlene Stewart Street of Fonthill, Ont., seventh-time winner of the open and Canada's most successful female golfer.

Miss Gagnon cleared away some of the toughest competition herself. She defeated Marilyn Palmer of Kamloops, B.C., in the second match-play round and edged Miss Renwick out.

Records Offer Double Dream

BRANDON (CP) — It's been 11 years since the Canadian Junior Golf championship went anywhere but Ontario or British Columbia.

That's a fact of history that gives 100-plus teen-age stars at Toronto a double incentive as the junior championships and interprovincial team matches open here today.

Besides hoping to loosen the grip of Ontario and B.C. rivals, they'll be recalling the subsequent career of the 1955 champion — George Knudson of Westpac — after he stopped a B.C. challenge for the honors.

Knudson, now playing out of Toronto, is one of Canada's most successful touring pros. He has said that his 1955 victory in the junior virtually launched his professional career.

Since he became the country's top junior, only two golfers from outside Ontario and British Columbia have even reached the 36-hole final.

Last year it was an all-Ontario affair over the 36-hole hole with Ian Thomas of London stopping Gord Stollery of Toronto.

Thomas, 17, will be on hand at the 35-hole par to Brandon Golf and Country Club to defend his title, although he is not a member of Ontario's top-junior interprovincial team.

Ontario is also defending the interprovincial title, played in connection with the 36-hole qualifying round over the first two days.

For other provinces, the interprovincial record is unimpressive. Similar to the statistics for the individual championship — Ontario is a three-time winner since the matches were inaugurated in 1959 and B.C. has brought home two team championships.

All provinces are entered in interprovincial play with New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island combining to form one team. Aggregate 36-hole winning scores determine the winner.

The top 44 qualifiers play four days of match-play Wednesday with the 20-hole round to start Thursday and the 36-hole Friday will set up the 36-hole final.

California Sets New Canadian Record

TORONTO (CP) — Bob Seagraven, a raw-boned, unassuming youngster from Pomona, Calif., Saturday set a Canadian open pole vault record at the Canadian National Exhibition's annual international track meet.

The 20-year-old veteran of international meets vaulted 16 ft. 2 1/2 in., surpassing the former mark of 16 ft. 1 1/2 set at Vancouver in June 1965.

Seagraven's effort before a crowd of about 7,000 set the highlight of an otherwise disappointing performance by track competitors.

The American national track team took all but two of the 14 events. Only Toronto native John Leaps and sprinter Edwin Roberts of Trinidad and Tobago broke the U.S. monopoly.

Leaps won his specialty in four minutes, 14.6 seconds, edging Gary Weisiger, a sub-four-minute miler from Los Angeles and Dave Bailey of Toronto.
