More than three hundred people from many parts of the province assembled Sunday morning in the new United Baptist Church at O'Leary to participate in the dedication of the beautiful edifice to the glory of God and the service of mankind.

Rev. C. O. Howlett, B.A. B.D. who has been minister of the congregation for more than thirteen years, conducted the worship. Rev. R. E. Witney of Wolfville, N.S., superintendent of the home mission board of the Maritime Convention of the United Baptist Church, preached the sermon.

The standing congregation then shared in a responsive service of dedication of the building which concluded with the words of rededication.

Then followed the impressive dedicatory prayer by Rev. Dr. Merrick and the solo, "Bless This Church" by Mr. Smith.

Lobster Gear Is Damaged In Alberton-Tignish Districts

Damage to lobster gear at Alberton and Tignish was considerably heavier than previously expected from the storm which got underway last Thursday and continued until Friday evening.

Fishermen were able to get out to their gear on Saturday for the first time since running their lines on Wednesday. Traps were found to be in a tangled condition with heads smashed out from the action of the sinking ballasts moving around inside the traps, ropes chafed to a degree equalling season of use and an undetermined number damaged beyond repair.

Although the catch landed Saturday was disappointing, the action of the storm was partly blamed and it is considered too early to form an estimate as to the seasons' prospects.

Two British Firms Planning Merger

LONDON (CP) — The giant Hawker Siddeley Group, one of Britain's largest aircraft concerns, is planning a link-up with the John Brown shipbuilding enterprise.

A Hawker Siddeley spokesman says negotiations are under way between the two companies but "no further details" can be given at this time. London financial circles believe a merger between the two major engineering groups would be for atomic purposes, probably the development of atomic-powered ships.

The merger plan is the latest in a series of moves by Hawker Siddeley to diversify its output. The group's Canadian subsidiary, A. V. Roe, recently obtained a large stake in Algoma Steel Corp. and last week the group announced a take-over offer to shareholders of Brush group, which has important nuclear power interests.

The Cunard liners Queen Mary and Queen Elizabeth were built at John Brown's shipyards on the Clyde.

Study Is Made Of Heart Disease

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A study of hidden heart disease has shown that available medical techniques can spot only a small percentage of the seemingly healthy people who are about to develop that trouble.

Among 1,652 people found by various procedures to be normal, heart disease developed within 30 months in 52 of them and potential heart disease in 46 others. Thirteen of these 1,652 actually died of heart trouble in the 2½ years.

At the same time 30 out of 80 people who originally showed suspicion of heart disease had no cardiac symptoms after the 30 months. And 11 out of 165 people spotted as heart cases in the initial test turned out to have normal hearts 2½ years later.

Also among the 165 detected heart cases and the cases which developed among normal people in the 30 months there were 26 deaths from coronary disease. Examination techniques detected advance signs of coronary trouble in only six of the 26.

These findings were reported Wednesday to the California Medical Association by a group of investigators headed by Dr. L. S. Goerke, assistant dean of the public health school of the University of California at Los Angeles.

The electrocardiogram had only 29.3 per cent accuracy in diagnosing heart disease in normal people who were found to have suspicious signs. It showed abnormal readings in 249 persons who later were found to have no heart trouble.

Details of the accident were not available but it is believed the little girl was playing or sitting on the curb on Poplar Avenue, and in some manner was caught between the curb and a car driven by Harold MacLeod while parking in front of the home of Fred MacLeod.
